

Canadian Wheat Growers' Plight Declared Tragic

The plight of Canadian wheat farmers as the result of uncontrolled production far in excess of domestic use plus export may well serve as an object lesson to American farmers, believes R. M. Evans, national administrator of the AAA, who recently visited Oregon to confer with state officials of the Agricultural Conservation program.

The Canadians now have an all-time record-breaking supply of wheat on hand. Their storage facilities are completely swamped and growers are being forced to pile wheat out in the field and protect it as best they can with temporary shelters, or even with thatched roofs made of grain straw, Evans reported.

Each grower has been issued a quota which permits the marketing of only eight bushels per acre out of this year's crop. As some of the yields go as high as 40 bushels this means that Canadian farmers will be compelled to hold the bulk of their grain without the aid of a government loan program, he explained. While the Canadian government has maintained a minimum price for wheat of approximately 70 cents per bushel at eastern terminals, it is a prison offense to market more of the crop than is represented by quota coupon books issued the growers, Evans reported.

The Canadian wheat crop this year amounted to about 560 million bushels, which is more than twice as much as they normally need meet the domestic demand and probable export movement. In addition they already had a 300 million bushel carry-over of old-crop wheat, making a total of 860 million bushels. Canada alone could supply all normal import demand for the entire world, said Evans.

In the face of this condition the Canadian officials are now reported to be considering a plan to cut acreage next year enough to provide a crop of only about 200 million bushels, which would mean reducing this year's area more than half.

Evans declared that American farmers might just as well face the fact that world conditions are not what they were 10 or 20 years ago, and they will have to regulate their production accordingly.

Neglect of Accident Hazards Claims 32,000 Lives Annually in U. S. Homes

Falls and Burns Leading Causes, Red Cross Warns in Safety Appeal

Washington, D. C.—The American Home—traditionally the symbol of security and safety—rivals the highway as the scene of the nation's greatest number of accident fatalities.

In a statement issued here by the Home and Farm Accident Prevention Service of the American Red Cross, it was pointed out that accidents in the home, including falls, burns and other common mishaps, claimed 32,000 lives last year—only 600 less than the number of motor vehicle deaths. Farm accidents accounted for an additional 4,200 deaths.

Statistics showed that home deaths last year increased 500 over the preceding year and farm accidents increased 300. In addition to a mounting death toll, home and farm accidents last year caused upwards of 4,700,000 injuries which resulted in economic losses running into millions of dollars.

To reduce the number of rural and urban accidents in and about the home, the American Red Cross in 1935 inaugurated its accident prevention program as a parallel project with the First Aid and Life Saving Services. This year, 9,000,000 "check lists" describing accident hazards and urging their removal will be distributed throughout the country.

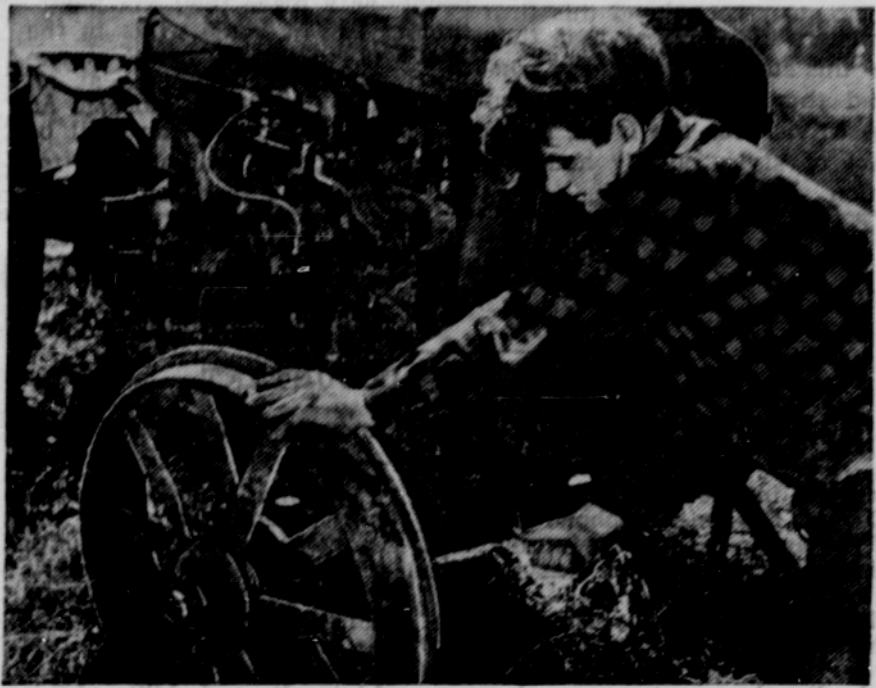
Approximately 2,000 Red Cross chapters have undertaken a program to acquaint householders in their vicinities with accident hazards in the home and on the farm. Chapters will be aided by the Junior Red Cross and the schools in distributing the "check lists."

The program will stress the vital need for removing accident hazards causing falls, as this type of accident resulted in more than half of last year's home accident fatalities. Burns and explosions caused the next heaviest loss of life.

Accident prevention is one of seven services conducted day-to-day by the American Red Cross in its tireless campaign against accidental death and suffering arising from disaster and other causes of emergency nature. These services are supported solely by members who join each year during Roll Call, November 11-30.



Each year 1,400 adults and children die from accidental poisoning. Label bottles clearly and keep them out of reach of children.



Accidents on the farm yearly injure 200,000 persons and machinery is the leading cause. Most deaths and injuries are due to carelessness.

Five Counties Show Shift in Population

PORTLAND, Oregon. — Baker, Clatsop, Crook, Umatilla and Wasco counties reversed their 1920-1930 population decline, and showed an increase of inhabitants for the 1930-1940 census period, according to an analysis of 1940 official U. S. census figures made by Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc., of Portland.

Principal other important population shifts in Oregon during 1930-1940, were the rapid growth of the state's coast communities, principally Clatsop, Lincoln and Curry counties; the continued population decline in five eastern Oregon large-scale farming counties, Gilliam, Jefferson, Morrow, Sherman and Walla Walla counties; tremendous population expansion in Crook and Malheur counties, and a slowing down of Oregon's population growth in the last ten years compared with 1920-1930.

Oregon's 1940 official population of 1,087,717 was 14 percent greater than the 1930 total of 953,786, but the 1930 population was 21.8 percent greater than the 783,389 in 1920. Oregon's "population tide" slowed down considerably during the past ten years, the Oregon Business and Tax Research, Inc. survey showed, in spite of influx of "dust bowl" and mid-west drought refugees and development of several new types of agriculture and industry.

Sherman county's 1920-1930 population declined 22.2 percent, and another 21.8 percent in the 1930-1940 period.

Lane county's official 1940 population was 69,022, against 54,493 for 1930 and 36,166 for 1920, or a net gain of 32,854 during the past twenty years, or a 90.8 increase in inhabitants since 1920.

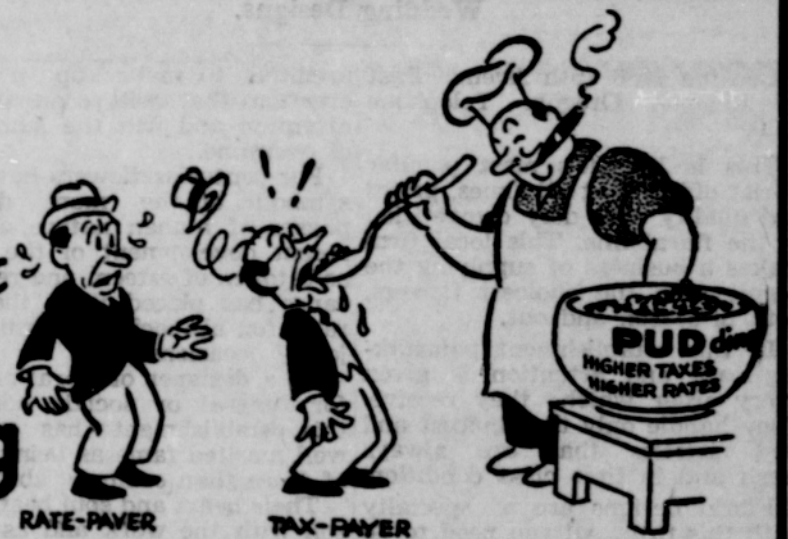
