Premium List for State Corn Show Ready at College

The new premium list for the fourth annual Oregon State Corn show, to be held at Oregon State college November 22 and 23, has just been issued showing a longer list of prizes than ever before, and a full series of championship cups and trophies such as were offered last year. Reports from many parts of the state indicate that more exhibits will be entered and that attendance will probably be much greater than in past years, says C. W. Smith, chairman of the committee in charge.

As was done last year, the state has been divided into four districts so that growers in each will compete only with corn grown under similar conditions, except in determining the final sweepstakes winner of the entire show.

District No. 1 consists of northern Willamette valley counties plus Hood River, Columbia, Clatsop and Tillamook; district No. 2 includes the central Willamette valley counties and Lincoln; district No. 3 is made up of southern Oregon from Douglas county south, and district No. 4 includes all counties east of the Cascades with the exception of Hood River.

The new open class for hybrid corn is attracting considerable interest, reports Dr. R. E. Fore, secretary of the committee. Instead of the usual 10-ear display, an exhibit for this will consist of 20 ears. Ten of these are to be shown as an ear exhibit while the other ten will be shelled by the management and judged with the ears. While no one exhibit may be entered in more than one class or district, a grower may enter exhibits in both the open pollinated and hybrid classes.

The annual corn shucking contest for growers will again be held, with both cash prizes and a silver cup being offered. Four judging contests will also be held for adult growers, college students, 4-H and FFA members.

A total of \$500 in cash prizes, donated by the First National Bank of Portland, will be awarded exhibitors. Other Portland business men are assisting in financing the show, while the Grange, Farmers Union, and Farm Bureau are helping the OSC extension service sponsor it and are providing class championship cups. The Sweepstakes trophy is donated by C. I. Sersanos of Portland.

CREDENTIALS REQUIRED TO HAUL CHRISTMAS TREES TO CALIFORNIA.

All persons hauling Christmas trees into California will be required to have with them proper credentials showing that the trees are their rightful property. This requirement is in accordance with a new California law, the provision of which have been furnished to Forest Supervisor Harpham of the Umpqua national forest.

The law requires a notarized statement of ownership for all trees cut within the state of California to accompany the shipment of trees. It is understood that trees cut outside the state do not require the notarized statement but that all truck shipments will be stopped by state officials, and therefore appropriate credentials should accompany each shipment of Christmas trees.

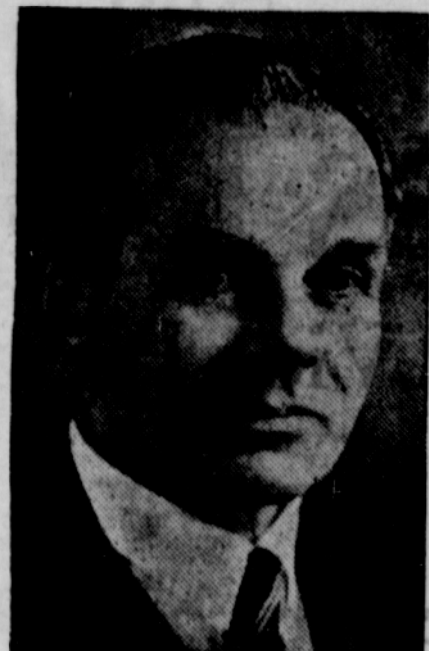

RURAL YOUTH NEED MOST GUIDANCE IN VOCATIONS

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—The problem of vocational guidance is most acute in rural areas, believes O. B. Badger, director of the vocational education division of the Portland public schools, who addressed the Oregon Guidance association here recently.

Director Badger, who came to Portland from Tulsa, Oklahoma, last April, pointed out that 30 to 40 per cent of rural youths must go to the city because of the increased mechanization of agriculture and the decreased birth rate in the cities.

He outlined to a meeting of school men from all over the state

what he considers to be the essentials of a realistic guidance program for Oregon's public schools. One item stressed was that those who counsel on vocational guidance must have wide experience with various occupations and have the type of personality which will appeal to youth.

AAA SUPERVISORS TO START WORK

In preparation for a check on Lane farms where the AAA program is in operation there will be a school of the 24 county supervisors at the Four-H building at the county fairgrounds in Eugene starting at 10 a. m. Friday.

The supervisors will receive instructions on their particular duties which include inspection of acreage, plantings and use of fertilizer and other matters that are checked under the federal AAA.

The supervisors will start work November 6.
