

Pontiac to Build 300,000 Cars 1941

NEW YORK, Oct. 14. — With new car production up 70 percent over last year Pontiac is planning a 300,000 car year in 1941, D. U. Bathrick, vice president and general sales manager of Pontiac Motor Division, today told a meeting of key dealers in the Waldorf-Astoria.

"We now have our production at a point where your demands are being met promptly," Bathrick said. "During October we will produce 30,000 cars—the biggest month Pontiac has ever had. And we are planning no dealer expansion program despite this volume increase."

TONS OF SEED GATHERED BY SCS NURSERY UNITS

ASTORIA—More than 20 tons of grass seed for erosion control demonstration planting in Oregon and other parts of the Pacific northwest, were harvested in this state this year by the soil conservation regional nursery division, which maintains a unit here. Robert L. Brown, in charge of the Astoria nursery unit, has reported one of the most varied seed collections of the entire region, which included seed from grass, legumes, and other plants for sand dune erosion control use.

The 14,300 pounds of seed gathered by the Astoria nursery unit included 7,000 pounds of seashore bluegrass seed, 3,246 pounds of Seaside lupine, 2,100 pounds of native red fescue, 800 pounds of beach pea, 170 pounds of Scotch brome, 100 pounds of a new plant called tree lupine, 85 pounds of cascara, and approximately 800 pounds of miscellaneous sorts.

Harvesting was done by CCC enrollees from the SCS Warren camp, which has been engaged in sand dune control work south of the mouth of the Columbia river since 1935.

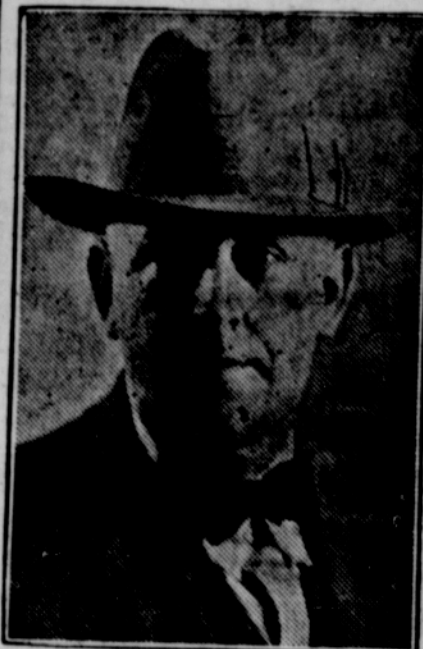
