

Sensational Car to Be Shown Here

Chrysler's streamlined car of the future, the "Newport" which has been shown, will be on display here at the showrooms of McCoy Motors, local Chrysler-Plymouth dealers from 7:00 p. m. to 8:00 p. m. Tuesday, November 12th.

According to L. J. McCoy the car features aerodynamic styling that forecasts future motor car design.

The Newport will be accompanied here by regional Chrysler officials and an illustrated lecture that explains the process of aerodynamic evolution by which the design of the car has been developed.

"The Chrysler Newport is a new mile post in the history of aerodynamics and 'fashioned-by-function' design. It is so forward looking in appearance, that it is little wonder it has been the hit attraction at the New York, Los Angeles and San Francisco automobile shows," Mr. McCoy said.

He pointed out that the development of racing cars had a large influence on the design of Chrysler's latest example of advanced streamlining. Chrysler engineers have followed the progress of these record-setting machines very closely for the last 15 years and have learned from them the importance of body design in increasing speed, roadability and handling ease.

These practical demonstrations, plus the most exhaustive studies of aerodynamics in the wind tunnel and elsewhere, conducted by Carl Breer, Chrysler Corporation executive engineer, and his associates, resulted in the creation of the Chrysler Airflow car in 1934. This car was the first to present true functional design and its influence on all motor car design has been tremendous. Chrysler engineers predict that the new "Newport" will have an even greater influence in the near future.

Mr. McCoy added that the public actually would have to see the car to fully appreciate its advance styling. At the same time he extends a cordial invitation to all local residents to visit his showrooms during the limited time the car is on display. He further pointed out that in a recent one day showing at Sacramento, California, more than 8,500 people by actual count visited the dealer's place of business.

U. O. Enrollment In New High Total

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, November 2 (Special).—The 3700 mark, hope of University of Oregon officials, was reached and passed by students registering at the University of Oregon for the fall term, it was announced here by C. L. Constance, assistant registrar. Total for the term is 3,704, an increase of three percent over the 3607 of fall term of 1939 and a new all-time record for this time of the year.

Men students showed but a slight increase, from 2232 to 2241, but women upped their total from 1375 to 1463. Greatest gain in classes was made by the juniors, who raised their total from 290 to 348, an increase of 20 percent. Sophomores increased from 1311 to 1490 and graduate students showed an increase of 13 percent from 214 to 242.

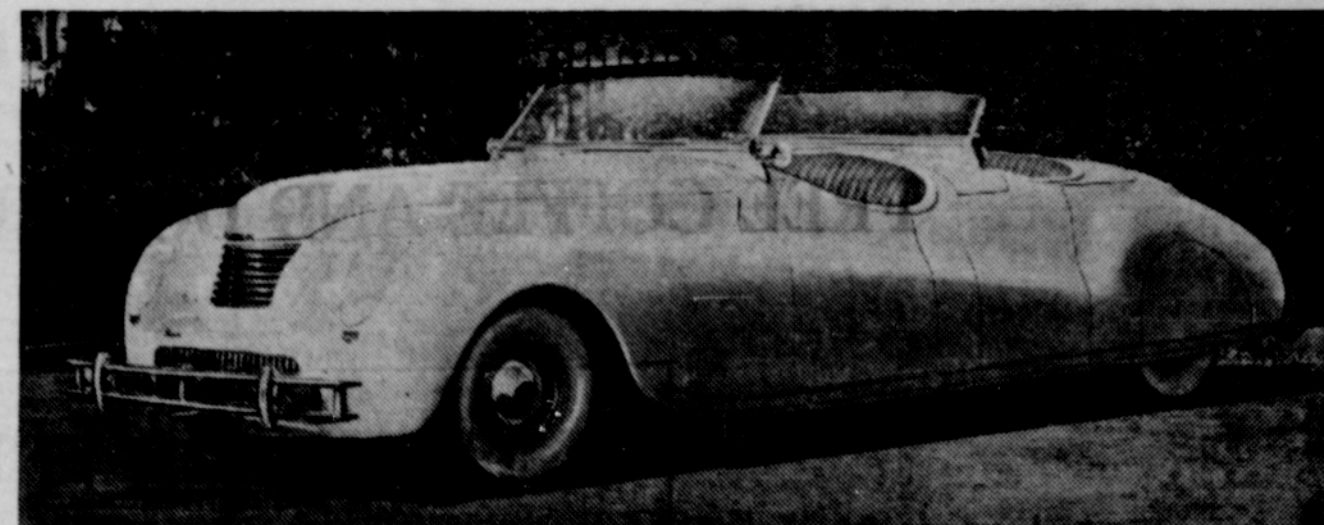
