METHODISTS LEAD CHURCH PREFERENCES AT COLLEGE

OREGON STATE COLLEGE.—The Methodist and Presbyterian denominations lead among 33 church preferences given by the 4752 students enrolled here this term. The first 10 in numbers of preferences follow:

Methodist, 681; Presbyterian, 620; Catholic, 324; Episcopal, 288; Christian, 280; Baptist, 247; Congregational, 141; Christian Science, 138; Lutheran, 96, and Mormon, 69.

A total of 1478 marked no preference, while 61 gave Protestant without denomination. Giving Jewish preference were 12, Friends 7; Buddhist, 4. One each signed up as Mohammedan, Mission Covenant, Mennonite, Full Gospel, Free Methodist, and Bible. One said he was an atheist and one an agnostic.

On November 11, a total of 1571 new Pontiacs were produced. Previous high day for the year was 1498 cars on October 23, Bathrick said.

"We have scheduled more than 30,000 new Pontiacs for the month of November," Bathrick said. "This will make the month the greatest November in our history which is particularly gratifying in that October also set an all time record both for production and retail sales."

On Friday, November 15, motorists, truckers, service station operators and others interested in highway transportation, pause for the "Breathless Moment" of 1940 when the Nation's gasoline tax bill passes the billion-dollar mark, according to Ralph A. Coan, Port-

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land, treasurer of the Oregon State Motor Association.

The motor association official said that the motorists of Oregon will have footed the bill to the tune of \$14,259,773. Of this amount \$11,524,168 represents state tax on the motor fuel and the remainder—\$2,735,605—will have been paid as federal tax on motor fuel.

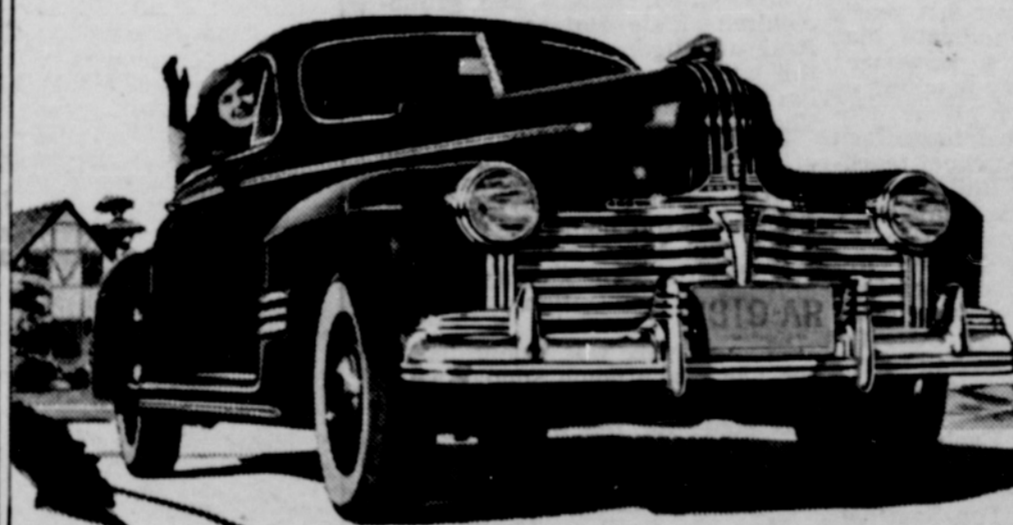

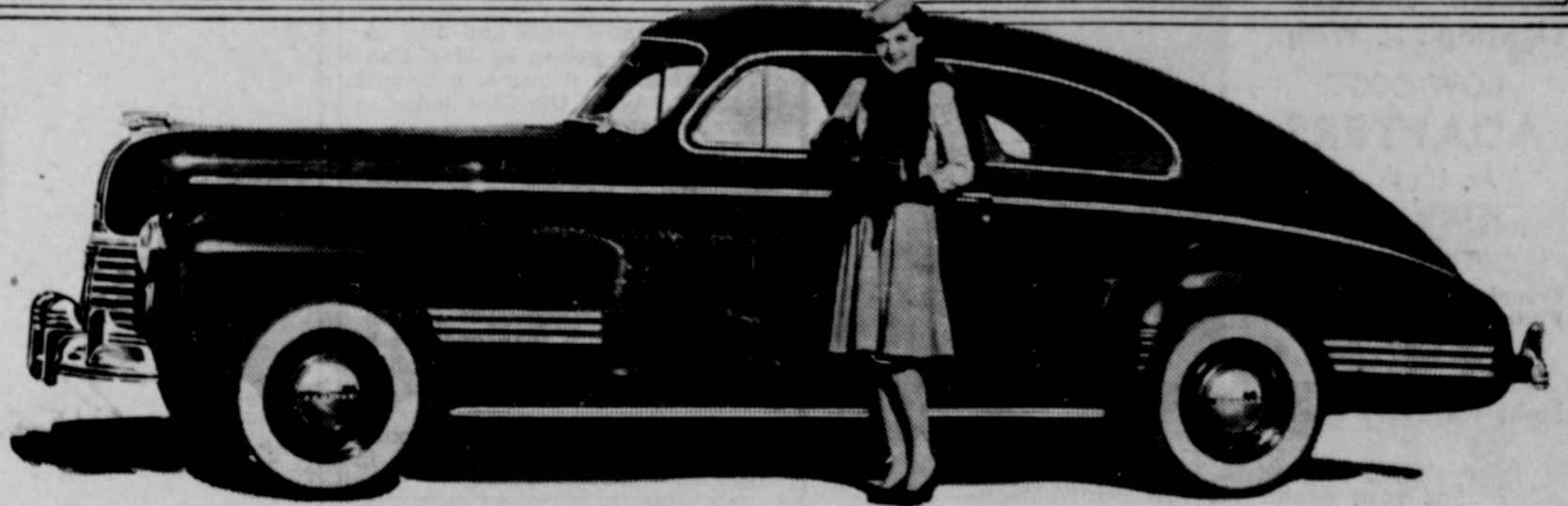
