

### Five Counties to Furnish 40 Men

SALEM, Oregon—Local boards for selective service in five Oregon counties will furnish a total of 40 men, selected from registrants who have volunteered for a year's military training, to report in Portland, November 18 for induction into the Army of the United States, Lt. Colonel Elmer V. Wooton, state director of Selective Service, announced here today.

The forty men compose the first installment of a total of 2806 men which this state is expected to supply for the nation's armed forces by next June. An additional 43 men will be supplied November 20 and other groups will be furnished at intervals of about a month until the entire 2806 quota is filled.

Since the Oregon local boards have reported about 300 registrants as volunteers for induction the local boards which reported earliest with the largest number of volunteers were chosen to furnish the men for the November 18 quota. Colonel Wooton stated that more volunteers would be selected to fill the November 20 quota and any remaining volunteers would probably report for induction early in December.

The local boards furnishing men November 18 and the number to be furnished by Lane county boards are listed below:

Lane County Local Board No. 2, five; Lane County Local Board No. 2, two; Lane County Local Board No. 3, five.

#### ENROLLMENT LESS AT OCE.

OREGON COLLEGE OF EDUCATION, Monmouth.—Lane county representation at the Oregon College of Education numbers 17 students. Of these six are freshmen, six are juniors, and five are seniors. Total enrollment figures at OCE are 486, which shows a decided decrease over last year's figures. This would indicate that there is at present a movement away from elementary teaching as an occupation, which, if it continues will lead to a definite lack of well-trained grade school teachers. The decrease is probably due to the mistaken idea that there are too many teachers and to the low minimum salary law in Oregon, although very few teachers start at the eighty-five dollar level. All graduates at OCE for the past few years have had teaching positions offered to them.

### State Employment Is on the Increase

A reduction from 55,000 a year ago to 27,000 unemployed in Oregon, attributed to an industrial boom, was disclosed today by the state unemployment service.

The figure of 27,000, which includes WPA workers, was the lowest since the first effects of the depression were felt. An extensive ship building program was responsible for taking up a large part of the slack in employment, officials said.

Large gains in lumber employment were reported.

Employment here is about on a standstill, Harold Machen of the employment office announced Monday. At the present time there are no new jobs opening up to take additional laborers. The highway strip contract has been finished and work has been slowed down at the Coast Ford dam and these two factors have tended to hold new employment to a minimum, he said.

There are several calls made almost daily at the employment office with reference to government work on defense contracts, but until the labor census is completed, the local office will not likely be able to make any placements in this work, although one man has been sent to a government job at Astoria.

#### AUTO STOLEN IN EUGENE.

An automobile belonging to J. R. Cann of Cottage Grove, was stolen in Eugene at noon Thursday and was recovered at 10 p. m. the same night in Kelso, Washington, by Sheriff Richards.

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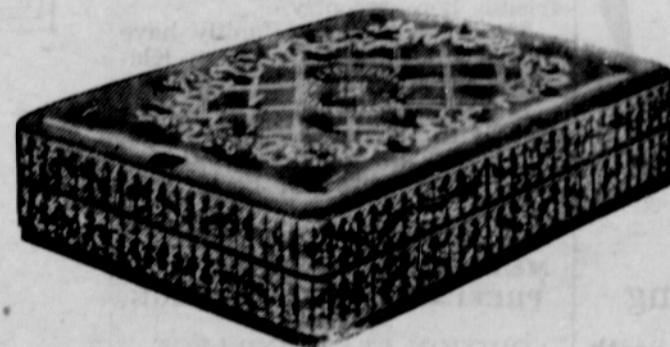
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
