## FIRST TWELVE MEN LEAVE FOR CAMP MURRAY

Lane county's first quota of 12 men called under the national selective service act left for a year's military training at Camp Murray, Washington, Monday morning.

These first 12 men are all volunteers, so men holding low draft numbers will not be affected until at least after the first of the year, it was indicated. An additional 23 men have volunteered but will not enter training until the second call.

From draft board three, the five who went are Albert Irvin Parrott, Thomas Wilfred McElroy, Robert Edgell, Clark Matt Parrott, and William Alvin Bentley, all from in or near Springfield. There are none from south Lane county, which is included in draft board 3.

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
