Pacific Telephone And Telegraph to Spend \$46,000,000

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company and its subsidiaries will spend in gross construction in 1940 a total of \$46,000,000, and it is now anticipated that in 1941 the gross construction expenditure will run well in excess of \$55,000,000 throughout the Pacific coast, in keeping pace with the public's requirement for telephone service and in meeting effectively and patriotically the company's responsibilities in the national defense program, it was announced recently by N. R. Powley, president.

This two-year construction program of approximately \$100,000,000, stated Powley, is one of the largest in the history of the company. The expenditures are in general in the following classifications: Land and buildings, \$3,800,000; central office equipment, \$25,000,000; station equipment, \$41,800,000; exchange lines, \$18,000,000; toll lines, \$10,200,000; general equipment, \$2,200,000.
