**Technological Changes**  
Technological changes have taken the jobs of 78,140 coal miners in the past 15 years, said Thomas Kennedy, secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers. Improved machinery, he said, was one blade of an "economic scissors," which reduced the number of men needed to mine a ton of coal. The other blade was "greater efficiency in heat engineering and competition from other energy sources," which reduced industry's requirements for coal. Between 1923 and 1938, he said, anthracite consumption had been reduced 47,200,000 tons a year, and bituminous consumption 219,000,000 tons.

**Income**  
The lowest per capita income in the United States in 1938 was in Mississippi, with \$205. New York was the highest with \$822. The per capita income payments in this country, the same year, was \$515, about \$160 less than in 1929.
