

"Go Ahead" Signal Given Vocational Education Plan

The "Go Ahead" signal which had been waiting on federal approval, has been received by the State Board for Vocational Education in the form of a wire from the U. S. Office of Education, indicating that the plan has received approval, subject to interpretation, for an extension of the defense training program, to include rural and non-rural youth on the post-school level.

Members of the State Board had approved the supplementary state plan at a recent board meeting. But final approval was up to official Washington, in order that the necessary appropriation might be made available for such emergency training.

In the meanwhile, many school principals and school superintendents who had word of such proposed decentralized program being put in operation in certain communities or centers that have available satisfactory equipment, have been writing the State Board of Vocational Education, asking details, inquiring how they might be eligible for such assistance, how they could cooperate, or if their shop space was adequate.

The extended program of emergency training which is now to include rural and non-rural out-of-school youth, covers young people who have attained the age of 17 years, but who have not reached their 25th birthday, who desire training, and have the ability to profit from such training. The term "rural youth" is interpreted to mean young people who live in communities with a population of less than 2,500 people. CCC boys may be enrolled in such courses. NYA project workers are also eligible for enrollment in courses organized under this supplementary plan.

It is not expected that all communities will provide instruction in all of the approved courses, but many communities will select the course or courses that they are prepared to offer and for which there is a demand and a need. Of course, in the selection of these courses much depends on available facilities and equipment, characteristics and experiences of the individuals to be trained, and those available to serve as instructors for the courses.

The courses include: operation, care and repair of tractors, trucks, and automobiles (including both gas and diesel engines), metal work, including simple welds, tempering, drilling, shaping, and machinery repair, woodworking, elementary electricity, including operation, care and repair of electrical equipment.

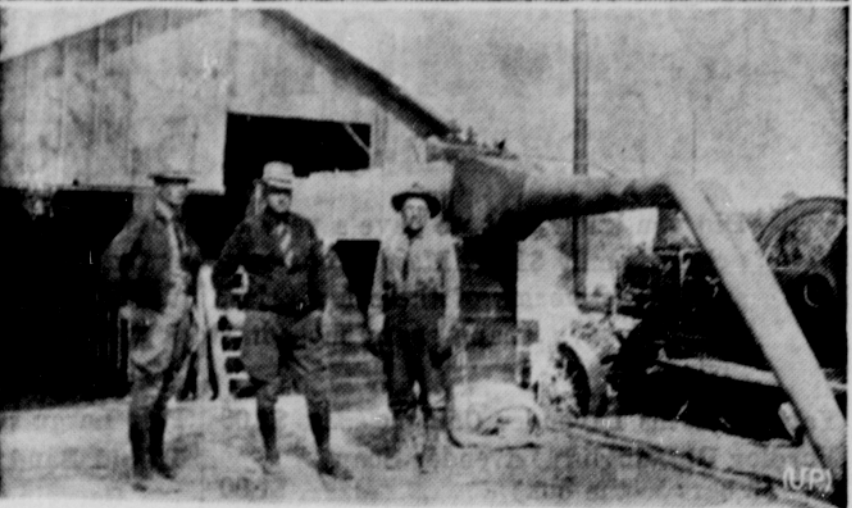
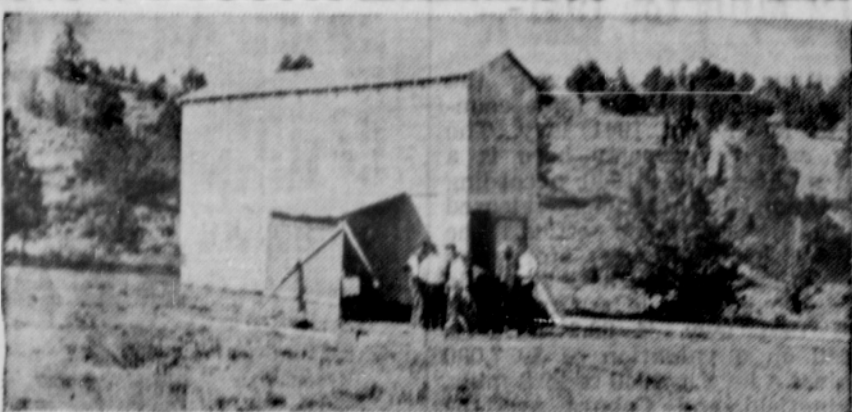
Oregon youth will receive both specific and general pre-employment training, at centers where vocational agriculture is taught, with the vocational agricultural instructor serving as coordinator for this program according to notices just mailed out by Acting State Director of Vocational Education O. I. Paulson, to superintendents or principals of high schools, vocational agricultural instructors, and CCC educational advisers.

New Process Enhances Tin Find

MATTRESSES TO BE MADE BY GROUPS IN LOW BRACKETS.

Highest quality cotton mattresses, made out of surplus cotton from southern states, will be available for low income rural families in Oregon at a cost of only the effort required to make them out of materials to be furnished, as the result of a cooperative arrangement completed recently, announces W. L. Teutsch, assistant director of the extension service at Oregon State college.

The mattress-making project will be started first in Malheur county next February, and will then be extended to Deschutes and Klamath counties in March, and to other counties as rapidly as the available staff can carry on the instructional and supervisory work, says Teutsch. This is a cooperative project with the extension service carrying on the education work, while the AAA and Surplus Marketing administration will supply the materials and be responsible for their delivery and distribution.

1941 Chevrolet Output Passes 300,000 Mark

DETROIT — The 300,000th unit of Chevrolet's 1941 production left the assembly line at the Flint, Michigan, plant Thursday, less than three weeks after completion of No. 200,000. The announcement was made here by M. E. Coyle, general manager of that division of General Motors.

"Achievement of the 300,000 mark at this early date in the new model year is a reflection of an exceptionally strong and general public demand, a demand which implies most enthusiastic reception of the new product," said Mr. Coyle. "The first of the 1941 models left the assembly line on September 3. This means that the first 300,000 of the new Chevrolet have been produced in 62 working days."

"On the basis of current indications, our plants will be required to operate at the today's high production rate for some time to come, to meet the present and prospective demand for automobiles and trucks."
