Number Skilled Workers Found In State House

If all state departments have as many skilled workers as were reported to the Board for Mobilization of Labor this week by one section, there will be many vacancies in statehouse offices when the emergency national defense program comes to Oregon.

A variety of occupational skills that would fill many of the 370 classifications listed as necessary by the national defense council was indicated in a report of a state department head to the labor board. With skilled labor shortages in certain lines looming ahead in the not distant future, officials are eyeing this department as highly important in the expansion of defense industries expected soon in this section.

Here are some of the occupations listed by the state employees: Armorer, boilermaker, tube bender, air brake expert, pipe calker, bucker-up, core maker and paster, cupola tender, powerhouse electrician, handsaw filer, gunsmith, airplane inspector, hoistman, millmen, boring mill operator, linotype operator, crane and ship rigger, rivet heater and catcher, sandblaster, trouble shooter, tracer, structural steel worker.

As the reports begin to come in from public offices and small firms to supplement the records of covered workers, many of the unusual skilled trades are being filled. Mobilization board officials are scanning the reports anxiously for lens grinders, radio experts, die makers and others who may be called for at any time by necessary industries. Particularly they are watching exports from outlying districts, as many of these highly skilled workers are in semi-retirement on small ranches or in one-man shops, officials believe.

With more than 4,000 concerns' complete reports awaiting tabulation, Leon S. Davis, director of the labor inventory, already has unearthed many peculiar misfit trades that he hopes to be able to correct soon.

Municipal Levy of 29.2 Mills for 1941

Cottage Grove is among the three municipalities in Lane county to lower the 1941 levy. The levy on city property here is a half mill less than 1940, according to official tabulations released from the assessor's office. The Sentinel carried a story two months ago stating the levy would be approximately a half mill less. The 1941 levy of 29.2 mills is based on a valuation of \$937,030 against a levy in 1940 of 29.8 mills. Springfield and Coburg are the other Lane county towns that have lower levies for 1941.

A levy of a fifth of a mill or 0.2 mills was made to meet the expense of the recent PUD election.
