Cooperation Is to Be Theme of All Wild Life Effort

"The greatest good to the greatest number" was put forth as a principle to guide in matters of fish and game conservation by the Oregon Wildlife Federation in its fifth annual conference at Oregon State college. By resolution and in discussion the federation took the position that economic factors and the relationship of agriculture and other industries need to be fully considered in any conservation effort.

At the same time the federation moved to make the organization one in which the organized sportsmen of the state would have control, thereby making the federation the authoritative voice of these groups. A plan was adopted to give each local sportsmen's club equal representation on the state body, regardless of the size of the membership. Other organizations interested in wildlife conservation may become associate members of the federation, without voting power.

William J. Smith of Portland was reelected president of the federation; Harris Ellsworth of Roseburg, vice-president, and Norman Davis, Portland, secretary-treasurer. The federation unanimously endorsed a proposal by Governor Charles A. Sprague to give the Oregon game commission more power in establishing hunting or fishing seasons and bag limits. The program of the game commission was endorsed, although request was made that more funds be devoted to scientific research.

The members voted to back a compromise coast stream bill which would stop commercial fishing for steelhead as certain seasons, but would not eliminate it entirely.

The organization also opposed the construction of the four high dams in the Cascade range, proposed as part of the Willamette valley project, although it voiced no opposition to the three coast range dams already authorized. A resolution on this subject held that any flood control to be derived from these dams could be obtained at half the cost through a system of levees.

Among the speakers at this year's conference was Dr. Ira N. Gabrielson, head of the United States wildlife service, who re-

ported notable national progress in conservation work, but urged continued efforts in all states.

Conference Adopts Resolution.

The Conference at Corvallis adopted a resolution presented by the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club, calling for the creation of a bird and migratory water fowl refuge at the Coast Fork and Fern Ridge dams.

The maximum temperature was 69 on the 29th and the minimum was 27 on the 22nd. Precipitation over the twenty-five year average was 7.33 inches for the month.

The regulations he goes by says if not over .3 of the day is overcast, the day is counted as clear; .3 to .7 percent part cloudy and cloudy is when the sky is overcast .8 percent.
