## MISUNDERSTOOD.

A number of people in this section know of an instance where a prominent professional man had to give up his profession in the last war because he was not a native-born American and because his sympathies were misunderstood. Instances where well-meaning people have been misunderstood in times of stress can happen again. In fact there was a wave of what might be called feeling bordering on war hysteria that swept over the country a few weeks ago in which rumors were numerous concerning the past history and activities of this or that individual. Of at least a half dozen rumors were heard against a half dozen persons, none have been true in the light of subsequent events.

We heard for instance that one was a machine gunner in the German army in the last war, that another was active in the interest of the German Bund, that another was a passionate admirer of Hitler and spent much time in giving the famous Nazi salute. The Sentinel has even been accused of publishing these rumors. The latter report is as groundless as the first rumors, because we, like any other newspaper, have never published a report that would intentionally reflect on the character of an individual without knowing the facts of the case or enough facts to establish reasonable grounds for such assertions.

We are not saying that there are no spies or enemy aliens among us, if there are we doubt if they would conduct themselves as some have reported to have done. The best thing to do if you are reasonably sure there are doubts as to the loyalty of an individual, report your belief to an officer so that the FBI agents may have opportunity to investigate.

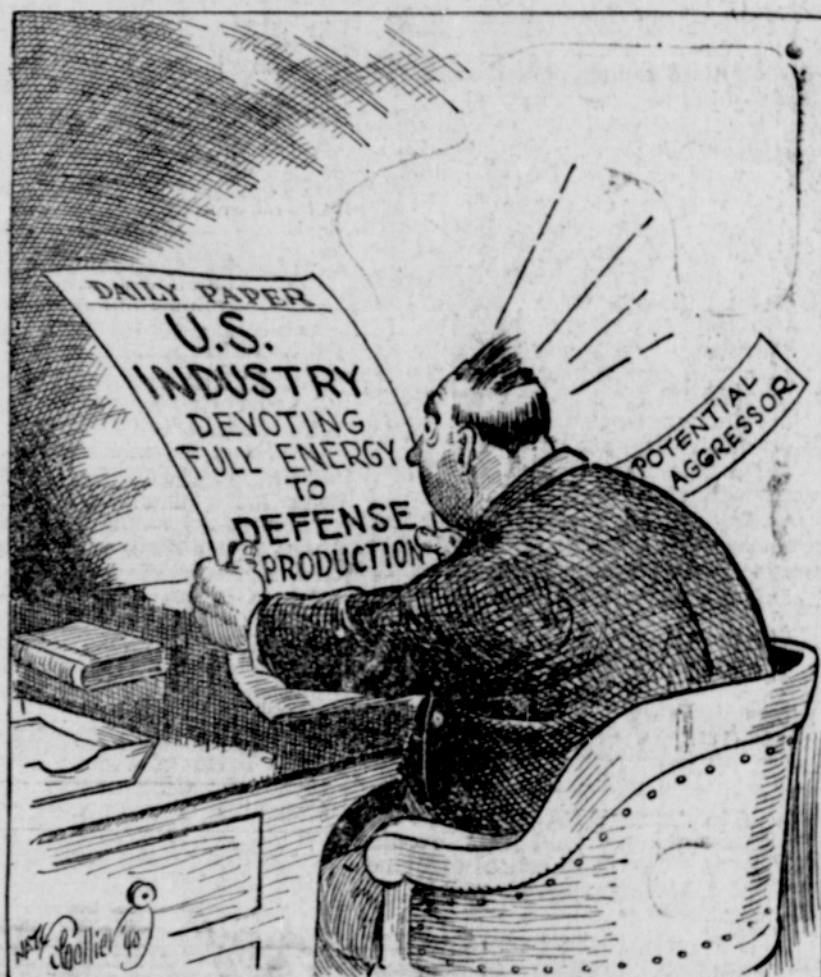

## Covered Wagon Days

Reminding tourists of America's pioneer days, a gigantic yoke of oxen, drawing a covered wagon across the plains, has been reproduced near the outskirts of Kearney, Neb. Built on a scale of 1 1/2 to 1, the team is 7 1/2 feet high, having been molded entirely by hand in concrete reinforced with steel. Wood was used for the wagon structure, the wheels, however, being encased in a layer of concrete.

## Pressing Necktie
