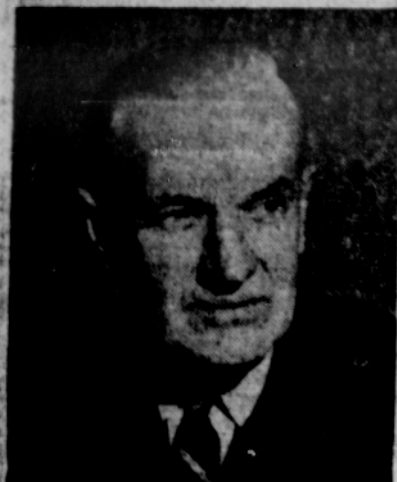


1940 S. P. Traffic Hits All Time High



Southern Pacific's volume of freight traffic in 1940 was the greatest in the company's history, ton miles having exceeded even the heavy traffic volume of 1929, according to a year-end report on the company's activities by A. D. McDonald, president.

"However," McDonald pointed out, "the company received about one-third of a cent less revenue on the average for each ton mile in 1940 than it did in 1929, equivalent to a reduction of 23 percent. If the 1940 revenue per ton mile had been the same as in 1929, freight revenues during the past year would have exceeded the total actually realized by more than \$50,000,000."

Southern Pacific's passenger traffic, which comprises about 10 percent of its total business, was less than in 1939 and was off 18 percent as compared with 1929, it was noted. Average revenue received per passenger mile was 40 percent less than in 1929.

"In spite of many difficulties, the railroads have created a New Era in transportation," McDonald said. "In freight train performance, measured by the number of gross ton miles handled hourly by the average freight train, efficiency was at an all-time high in 1940, exceeding performance of the year 1929 by 52 percent. Average speed of freight trains also exceeded that of 1929 by 28 percent."

"In passenger service speed has increased, all principal trains are now air-conditioned, and the latest developments in the arts and sciences are embodied in new equipment as it is ordered."

"Benefits from the New Era in railroading have gone to transportation users in the best service in history at the lowest average railroad rates in the world; to employees in highest wages in history; and to government in a substantial increase in the proportion of taxes paid to revenues received."

"By contrast, the owners of our properties, our stockholders, have received no dividends since 1932." "The Southern Pacific president said the railroads are confident of their ability to handle efficiently any added transportation load due to national defense activities."

McDonald emphasized the fact that Southern Pacific has commenced taking delivery on 2540 new freight cars, costing \$7,750,000. It also has on order 20 new streamlined steam locomotives, costing \$3,500,000, and 51 new lightweight streamlined passenger cars, costing \$3,500,000.

DRAFT EVADERS SENTENCED

PORTLAND, Oregon—The Rev. Paul R. Ackermann, Methodist minister, and Edwin A. Sanders, instructor of English at Pacific college, Newberg, were sentenced Friday to serve one year in a road camp for failure to register under terms of the national selective service act.

Federal Judge James A. Fee pronounced sentence and at the same time issued a stern warning from the bench to persons who had written letters to the court asking for leniency in behalf of the defendants.
