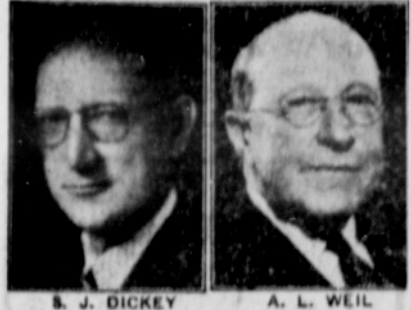


Dickey Leads GPA Chevrolet Sales Show 11 Percent Gain in December

DETROIT — Chevrolet dealers' retail sales of new cars and trucks during the second 10 days of December showed a gain of more than 11 per cent over the near-record figure for the corresponding period in 1939, and made important strides toward a new record in the 1941 model year, W. E. Holler, general sales manager, announced here today.

Sales for the period were 34,743, making a total of 66,172 for the month to date, a gain of approximately 5,000 units over the first 20 days of December, 1939. The figure for the final 10 days was 11.9 per cent above the 31,035 units reported in the same period of 1939, and 10.5 per cent above the total for the period immediately preceding. The sharpest gain was registered by commercial cars and trucks, sales of which were 35 per cent above those for the corresponding 10 days in December, 1939, and 39.6 per cent above the figure for the first 20 days of that month.

Substantial gains also were made in used car sales, the report shows. Sales for the second 10-day period totaled 45,990 units, for a total of 84,504 used cars in the month to date. Combined new and used car sales for the period were 80,733, and for the month to date 150,676, according to the report.

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Plan to Handle Deer, Elk Hides

A new plan for handling unclaimed deer and elk hides held by cold storage and locker plants of the state has been announced by the Oregon State Game commission.

Instead of destroying the hides, the various plants will ship hides to the Portland office for sale to the highest bidder. One-half of the new proceeds will be returned to the plants to reimburse them for handling the skins. Before shipment is made, the plants will first notify the Commission office of the number of hides on hand and state police officers will then check and tag the hides before shipping.

In announcing the new plan, the Game Commission makes it clear that any individual has the right to claim the hide of a deer or elk he has killed legally and if properly tagged, he may have it tanned and made up into articles of clothing. No individual has the right, however, to sell or barter such hides.

NEW CANTEN TRAILERS RECEIVED BY 'BUNDLES'



NEW mobile canteen trailer of which seven units have been contributed to Bundles for Britain, Inc., for shipment to the British Isles for the relief of hungry and homeless victims of enemy bombs. These units can be attached to the rear bumper of any automobile and readily towed to place where food is required. Kitchen trailers of this type can feed up to 300 at a stop when fully equipped and stocked.

NEW YORK—The first three of seven mobile canteen trailers contributed to Bundles for Britain, Inc., by individuals through the British-American Ambulance Corps have arrived in New York on their way to the relief of the people of beleaguered Great Britain.

They were officially turned over to Mrs. Wales Latham, national president of Bundles for Britain by William V. C. Ruxton, head of the British-American Ambulance Corps in an informal ceremony at 484 Park Avenue in the names of the givers—Mrs. Emma W. Foy, Mr. and Mrs. Henry L. Moses and "Anonymously."

Canteen Trailers Feed 300

These canteen trailers, the product of William E. Detlor, of Detroit and Forest Hills, are a new departure in mobile kitchens. Each unit is about sixteen feet long and a little over seven feet wide, and of typical English Trailer design. They have six windows and counters for serving on both sides, front and rear, and will feed more than 300 persons at a stop.

The inside equipment consists of counters on all sides, two kerosene stoves for cooking and heating, a sink and assorted pots, pans and thermos type containers for carry-

ing foods. The canteens may be lighted by electricity or oil lamps. Each has a complete coupling mechanism by which it may be attached to the rear bumper of any automobile.

Costs From \$700 to \$1,850

Similar units are being purchased through various branches of Bundles for Britain along with other motor driven mobile kitchens manufactured in the United States. The cost of the trailers varies, according to the equipment, from \$700 to \$1,000. Still other types are being purchased in England.

The motor driven units are of two sizes and priced at from \$950 to \$1,850. The feeding capacities are from about 200 for the smaller size to 500 for the larger. The highest priced unit is completely equipped with stoves, heaters, containers, utensils, dishes and knives and forks.
