Ore. Unemployed Benefits Higher

SALEM.—By reason of a higher average weekly check of \$11.68 last year Oregon's unemployed received \$41,273 more in benefits than in 1939, according to the annual report by Administrator Silas Gaiser.

With the average check up from \$11.07 in 1939 and \$11.11 in 1938, the number of payments fell off 15,613 and continued claims decreased 103,353. Each eligible claimant drew an average of \$71.07, compared with \$88.29 in 1939, indicating shorter periods of unemployment, the administrator pointed out.

Actual benefits paid by the Unemployment Compensation Commission were \$4,099,925 against \$4,052,888 the previous year and \$5,916,399 in 1938.

Contributions were by far the heaviest yet, though part of the \$1,081,652 increase was accounted for by the change from monthly to quarterly reporting. Taxes paid by employers were: 1938, \$6,138,978; 1939, \$5,816,830; 1940, \$6,878,482.

The accumulating surplus left the trust fund at the end of the benefit year at \$10,009,061 compared with \$7,809,935 a year ago. The commission turned over \$590,392 last summer to the Railroad Unemployment Board, which now handles all railway men's claims. Oregon's claimants numbered 64,902 against 59,108 in 1939 and 95,878 the first year. Of these 57,690 claims were allowed, comparing with 45,971 and 82,514 in previous years. Those who drew at least one check were 46,962, an increase of 2,859 over 1939.

Drawing slightly over \$100 each on an average, 24,433 secured maximum benefits last year, comparing with 29,336 and 33,543 in previous years.

Continued claims dropped to 426,279 against 529,632 and 962,641 in previous periods. Actual weekly payments also registered a new low with 351,058 compared with 366,671 and 533,555 in the first two years.

David-Goliath Stand of Greeks Spurs Drive for Relief Funds

SUPPRESSED by fresh reports of the tiny Greek Army's heroic resistance to Mussolini's forces, the Greek War Relief Association has intensified its nationwide drive for \$10,000,000 to aid distress among the civilian population in the invaded areas.

Appeal for the funds, which will be used for the relief of civilian suffering behind the lines of the fighting Greek army was launched November 20. Already \$614,384.06 has been received for transmission to Athens for distribution by the Administrative Committee for American Relief in Greece.

The funds will go to purchase ambulances, food, clothing and other relief supplies needed to alleviate distress caused by the Italian invasion.

More than 500 local committees have been organized throughout the United States, with the assistance of 2000 Greek clubs and other organizations to aid the mother country.

Harold S. Vanderbilt, American philanthropist and sportsman, heads the list of distinguished men and women who are serving on the National Citizens Committee of which Mr. Vanderbilt is honorary chairman. The Most Rev. Athenagoras, Archbishop of the Greek Orthodox Church of North and South America, is national chairman; and Spyros P. Skouras, head of a national chain of motion picture theatres, is national president.

Also engaged in the appeal are Mrs. Huntington Astor, honorary national chairman of the Women's Auxiliary, and Grand Duchess Marie of Russia. Madame Kimon Diamantopulo is honorary sponsor of the Auxiliary.

Others who have enlisted in the cause for Greece are the Rt. Rev. Fulton J. Sheen of Catholic Univer-

sity and the Rt. Rev. Harry St. George Tucker, presiding Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church.

National headquarters have been established at 730 Fifth Avenue, New York City.
