NYA FOR OREGON.

A new three-point NYA health program for Oregon youth, designed to promote health, improve physical fitness of young men and women eligible for, or working on NYA work experience projects has been formulated, according to Ivan G. Munro, state administrator.

The program, approved by The Council Oregon State Medical Society, was developed in conjunction with the Oregon State Board of Health, co-sponsor, and the U. S. Health Service. Dr. Arch W. Diack will be state health consultant, while R. Bruce Brown will supervise activities throughout the state.

Plans, as outlined by Dr. Diack, call for a physical appraisal, by means of a competent physical examination of every youth assigned to the NYA out-of-school work experience projects. Follow-up services are planned for young men and women in need of care who are employed on projects by using local facilities in cities and towns throughout the state.
