Stock Market

The livestock market at the Portland union stock yards, during the week ended January 11th, showed 25 to 50c gains in the cattle prices, hog prices advanced 60 to 75c from late the previous week, and fat lambs were 25 to 50c higher. There were 2,602 cattle, 237 calves, 3,809 hogs and 2,136 sheep in the open market receipts during the past week.

Monday's trading this week included 2,572 cattle, 165 calves, 2,395 hogs and 2,045 sheep on the open market.

The demand was good and prices held up well in the cattle alleys Monday. Steers were fully steady with some sales 10 to 15c higher. Most of the fed steers sold at \$10.00 to 10.75, with a top of \$11.00. Short feds ranged down to \$9.00 with common steers down to \$7.50. Fed heifers brought \$9.00 to \$9.25. Canner, cutter and common cows sold around \$4.25 to \$6.00 with a few of the best dairy cows, up to \$6.50 or over. Good beef cows made 7.25 to 7.65, with light cows up to \$7.85. Bulls bulked at \$7.25 to 7.75, with common grades downward to \$6.00. Good to choice vealers sold readily at 10.50 to 11.50.

Cattle prices held steady in Tuesday's trading.

Monday's hog market made an outstanding advance of \$1.10 top over last Monday. Good to choice truck-ins weighing 170 to 215 lbs. cashed at \$8.75 to 8.85 early, and a few to \$8.90, while carload top was \$9.00. Late sales of truck-ins ranged down to \$8.60, with medium grades down to \$8.35. Butchers from 230 to 265 lbs. sold around \$8.00 to 8.25, with some in the rail division up to \$8.50. Light weights sold from \$7.75 to 8.25. Packing sows brought \$6.00 to 6.50, with heavy offerings downward to \$5.50. Good to choice feeder pigs made \$8.00 to 8.25, with an extreme top of \$8.50. Trade on top hogs Tuesday was in line with Monday.

Fat lambs Monday were 25 to 50c higher, with fat ewes fully 50c higher. Good to choice fed woolled lambs in the carload division sold from \$8.90 to 9.25, with a few truck-ins around \$8.75. Some fall shorn lambs sold around \$8.25 to 8.50, and recently shorn fed offerings were being held above \$8.00. Odd yearlings made \$7.25. Medium to good slaughter ewes sold at \$3.50 to 5.00, with one deck of fed ewes up to \$5.35.

Trading in the sheep alleys Tuesday showed generally steady prices.

CATTLE: Good grain-fed steers \$10.00 to 11.00. Good grain-fed heifers \$9.00 to 9.25. Good beef cows \$7.25 to 7.85, medium \$6.50

to 7.00, common \$5.90 to 6.25, canners \$4.25 to 5.25. Bulls, medium to good, \$6.75 to 7.75, common \$5.50 to 6.50. Vealers, good to choice \$10.90 to 11.50.

HOGS: Good to choice carlots, quotable, \$9.00; 170 to 215 lb. truck-ins \$8.75 to 8.85; 230 to 285 lb. butchers \$8.00 to 8.25; light-weight butchers \$7.75 to 8.25. Packing sows \$5.50 to 6.50, few to 7.00. Feeder pigs, \$8.00 to 8.25, few \$8.50 to 8.75.

SHEEP: Good to choice fed woolled lambs \$8.75 to 9.25; medium to good \$8.00 to 8.50; common \$7.50 to 7.75. Slaughter ewes, good to choice \$4.50 to 5.35. Shorn lambs \$8.00 to 8.25, fall shorn to \$8.50.

WINTER TERM ENROLLMENT AT OSC SAME AS IN 1940.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Despite flu epidemics and increased demand for men in defense industries, enrollment here for the winter term is almost exactly equal to the record winter term enrollment of a year ago, reports of Registrar E. B. Lemon reveal.

At the end of the first week the total enrollment was 4479 or just 8 more than that of a year earlier. The final total with all late registration in is expected to reach the 4,544 of last year.

Enrollment of women has reached 1553, 5 per cent more than last year, but the 2,926 total for men is a decrease of 3 per cent, largely accounted for by the increased employment opportunities. It is believed. The freshman and sophomore classes are both larger than a year ago.

250 TO BENEFIT.

Approximately 250 persons in Lane, Coos, Douglas, Curry and Josephine counties were entitled to receive monthly insurance payments from the federal government under the old-age and survivors insurance program of the social security act on January 1. Carl D. Monroe, Eugene manager of the social security board, announced yesterday.

Monthly payments under the federal act started a year ago. These payments are made to retired persons who are 65 or more years of age and have had sufficient employment and earnings at jobs covered by the law to entitle them to monthly benefits and also to the widow and young children of insured workers who have died.

HOLIDAY LIGHTS DOWN

The holiday season was officially over Friday when members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce took down the lights in the business district. Six stars ordered by the lighting committee were not erected, but will be used next December.

Defense Vocational Classes Proceeding

An advisory committee for planning and promoting a series of rural defense vocational classes which are now under way at the union high school building, was recently selected and met for the first time Tuesday night. The committee, consisting of F. W. Bickel, Paris Breedlove, Frances Horn and Henry Snauer, expressed satisfaction with the wood-working class now in operation. Sixteen young men have enrolled and are now studying drafting and blue-printing and the principles of carpentry. This class meets on Monday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings and on Saturday. Any young man between the ages of 17 and 25 is eligible for this class.

The committee recommended that classes in auto mechanics and in welding and forging be offered as soon as a sufficient demand appeared. Any who may be interested in either of these courses should get in touch with H. C. Williamson, vocational agricultural instructor, or H. B. Ferrin, superintendent of schools.

TWO SOUTH LANE STUDENTS MAKE OSC HONOR ROLL.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Jan. 14.—One student from Cottage Grove and one from Creswell made the honor roll here for the fall term, Registrar E. B. Lemon has reported. The roll includes only those students who make grade point averages of 3.50 or better while carrying 12 or more credits.

Gainey Edward Jacoby of Creswell, senior in engineering, was one of 35 students receiving straight-A grades in all courses, or a 4.00 average.

Opal Myers, junior in home economics from Cottage Grove, received a grade point average of 3.50 or above.

Only about 6 per cent of the 4759 students registered in the fall term made the honor roll. These represented every school and all classes, with the sophomores having the largest number but seniors having the largest percentage on the list.

Battery E News

A letter from Capt. Lawrence Morgan, until recently commander of Battery E, addressed to Dr. H. A. Hagen, president of the Cottage Grove unit of the 249th CA association, conveys the information that he has been assigned to the position of regimental plans and training officer. Capt. Robert M. Huston of Battery D (Albany) has been assigned to command Battery E. Capt. Faye Stewart has been assigned to command Battery D.

Officers expect to move the regiment to Fort Stevens before long and anticipate a supply of equipment for the mess halls there before long. Distribution of dishes and equipment may be held up until further plans are announced.

CARTNER SENTENCED.

Thomas Cartner, a WPA worker on the Cottage Grove dam, drew a six months jail sentence Saturday before Judge Carl Wimberly when arraigned before the circuit court judge on charge of assault and battery. He was accused of assaulting Mrs. Mary Hauser in Springfield on December 30th. Mrs. Hauser died soon after from pneumonia.

SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD DECIDES ON CHANGES.

The Lane county school district reorganization board met Tuesday at the courthouse to pass upon a few remaining school district combinations which are as yet undecided.

The Veneta and Noti districts were left as they are at the present time, as were the Union and Pioneer districts. The two Camas Swale districts will vote on consolidations soon, and according to L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent, if they do not consolidate, will be ordered to do so. By voluntarily voting for the merger, the districts will be saved considerable money, he said.

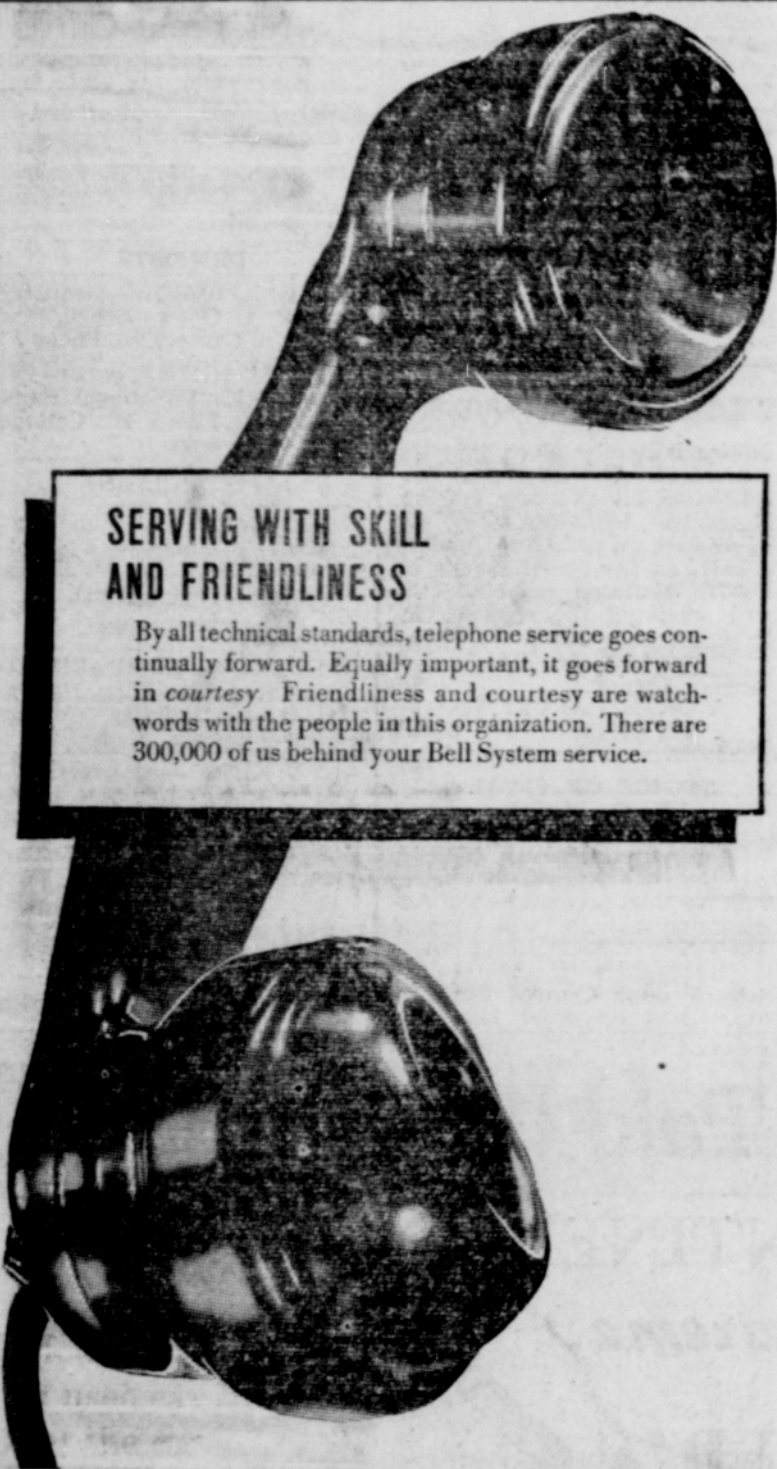
