CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"LIFE" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, January 19.

The Golden Text was, "I will give unto him that is athirst of the fountain of the water of life freely. He that overcometh shall inherit all things; and I will be his God, and he shall be my son" (Rev. 21:6, 7).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "God that made the world and all things therein seeing he is Lord of heaven and earth, dwelleth not in temples made with hands. For in him we live, and move, and have our being; as certain also of your own poets have said, For we are also his offspring" (Acts 17:24, 28).
