Employers Should
Pay Jan. Tax Now

Employers who expect to pay lower unemployment taxes under the experience rating plan scheduled to take effect on July payrolls must make payments by January 31 to be counted in their reserve under the present law, according to a recent regulation passed by the Unemployment Compensation Commission.

In making the announcement today, Administrator Silas Gaiser also called attention to the tax credit offset which also must be completed this month to avoid a 90 per cent penalty under the Internal Revenue Code. Failure to pay the 2.7 per cent tax due the State in January may subject the larger employers to the entire federal tax of 3 per cent, making a 5.7 per cent payroll tax in all.

Only those who employ eight or more during 20 weeks of the year are subject to the state tax, about 6,000 are expected to be eligible for the new rates under the experience rating plan after next July 1.

Employers must have been subject to the act for three years, "throughout which any individual in his employ could have received benefits if unemployed and eligible," which means that payment of unemployment contributions must have started no later than the third quarter of 1937.

While delinquent contributions—those made on fourth quarter payrolls after January 31—may be counted in figuring experience rates for 1942, the cut-off date has been fixed so that the commission will have sufficient time in which to make charge-backs and other computations in the first half of the year.

Employers must have a reserve of at least 8 per cent of their average annual payroll for 1938, 1939 and 1940 to be eligible for lower rates under the experience rating plan. If their reserve is less than 4 per cent of the average, they must pay rates higher than the present 2.7 per cent.

HULL AND WALLACE PRESIDENT OF U. S. BRIEFLY.
WASHINGTON — Secretary of State Hull was president of the United States for ten minutes Monday and Henry A. Wallace, the new vice president, actually was president for one minute. The 20th amendment of the constitution says that the term of the president shall expire at 12 o'clock noon, January 20. President Roosevelt did not take the oath of office from Chief Justice Hughes until 12:11 p. m. Vice-president Wallace was sworn in at 12:10. Capitol Hill interpreters of the constitution declared that in the interim, it was the secretary of state who was the chief executive of the nation until 12:10, then Wallace until 12:11. The constitution provides the succession of presidential office shall be the vice president, then the secretary of state, and down through the cabinet according to the ranks of the various secretaries.
