

AAA Conference Brings Concord On Knotty Items

"The spirit of cooperation was very evident and all seemed willing to give consideration to the other farmer's problems."

This statement, contained in one of seven committee reports adopted at the first state-wide AAA conference at Oregon State college, fittingly expressed the spirit prevailing throughout three days of concentrated attention to the various features of the farm program in Oregon, by some 200 county and state committeemen and extension agents.

The reports of the committees dealing with such things as the wheat, seed, and range programs, office efficiency, crop insurance, and information work, all emphasized the necessity of learning more about the local situations and adapting the program to serve best these needs.

Arrangements were made for close coordination of the work of each county committee with the forthcoming meetings in every county of the land use committees and the county outlook conferences sponsored by the extension service. It was agreed in general that the farm plan and estimate sheet sign-up this year would not begin until after each county has had its second economic outlook meeting.

The question of marketing quotas for wheat was probably given the most detailed attention, following a report showing that the supplies on hand at the end of the next harvesting season will undoubtedly be considerably above the point at which a vote on wheat marketing quotas is required by law.

The conference adopted a report of the committee on wheat problems stating that "members of the group expressed themselves unanimously as being in favor of quotas." Plans were discussed for carrying word to the non-commercial wheat growers regarding the importance of favoring marketing quotas to prevent the collapse of wheat prices.

NEW LONG-RANGE WEATHER FORECASTS NOW ON KOAC.

Long-range weather forecasts giving probable developments over a five-day period, are now being broadcast every Tuesday and Friday over KOAC, state-owned station on the Oregon State college campus. These forecasts are obtained twice a week direct from the Portland office of the weather bureau, over government leased wire, and are put on the air seven times each Tuesday and Friday, starting at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

G. R. Hyslop, head of the plant industries division of the school of agriculture, who carried on negotiations for the five-day forecasts, says that they are expected to be of outstanding value to Oregon farmers. Even though they are not 100 per cent accurate, the long-range forecasts will give a better indication than could be obtained previously of weather trends, and thus will be of value particularly to hay growers and livestock operators, as well as to horticulturists planning dusting or spraying operations. The information will also be of value during the planting season, and will be used by flax plants in connection with retting operations, Hyslop believes.

Metal Workers To Be Rewarded For Defense Ideas



A PLAN to uncover unknown Edison and Chrysler in the metal working industry, although less than one month old, has already brought in many recommendations to help speed the American industrial defense program.

Under this plan, sponsored by one of the largest metal fabricating companies in the United States, and known as the Revere Award, a total of \$10,000 in prizes will reward the foremen, sub-foremen or workers submitting the ten best suggestions for such devices or processes. All ideas, in addition, will remain the property of their originators.

Conceived as a clearing house for ideas for the National Defense Commission, the new Award has been already described by labor and industrial leaders as a Nobel Prize for American workmen. They have pointed out that much of our industrial supremacy today is founded on the ideas of



men who began at the bottom of shops and factories.
According to C. Dona

President of Revere Copper and Brass Incorporated, suggestions submitted do not have to be immediately related to the arms or munitions industries. It is necessary, however, that they can be applied so as to increase the output of plants supplying defense needs.

The main purpose of the Revere Award, Mr. Dallas stated, is to make available to the National Defense Commission the useful ideas of the 2,000,000 men in the metal industry who are closest to the stages of production.

The judges for the Award prizes will be Henry T. Heald, President of the Illinois Institute of Technology, Chairman; Admiral Joseph Strauss, U. S. Navy, retired; Major General Frank Parker, U. S. Army, retired; Robert J. Watt, former American workers' delegate to the International Management Congress at Geneva, Switzerland; and C. Donald Dallas, President, Revere Copper and Brass Incorporated.
