## Bridge Is A Cinch Says Sam Gordon

Contract bridge is a cinch, according to Sam Gordon. The Kibitzer, who is here for a series of contract bridge lesson-lectures January 30-February 1, in Masonic hall, sponsored by the Rainbow Girls.

He says the only aim of two partners in a bridge game is to tell each other how many tricks they expect to take; and what is their best trump suit, if any; and that's all. And to give that information, a player need not be a civil engineer, a statistician and a clairvoyant.

All he needs is to learn the few basic rules and signals used by experts and other practical players, which is the Horse Sense method, the only requirements to play an acceptable bridge game.

His method of counting tricks is the natural way any player would use if he were not confused by too many suggestions. You merely total up your aces, kings, queens, and the tricks you expect to trump. All other departments of the game are treated in the same vein of simplicity.
