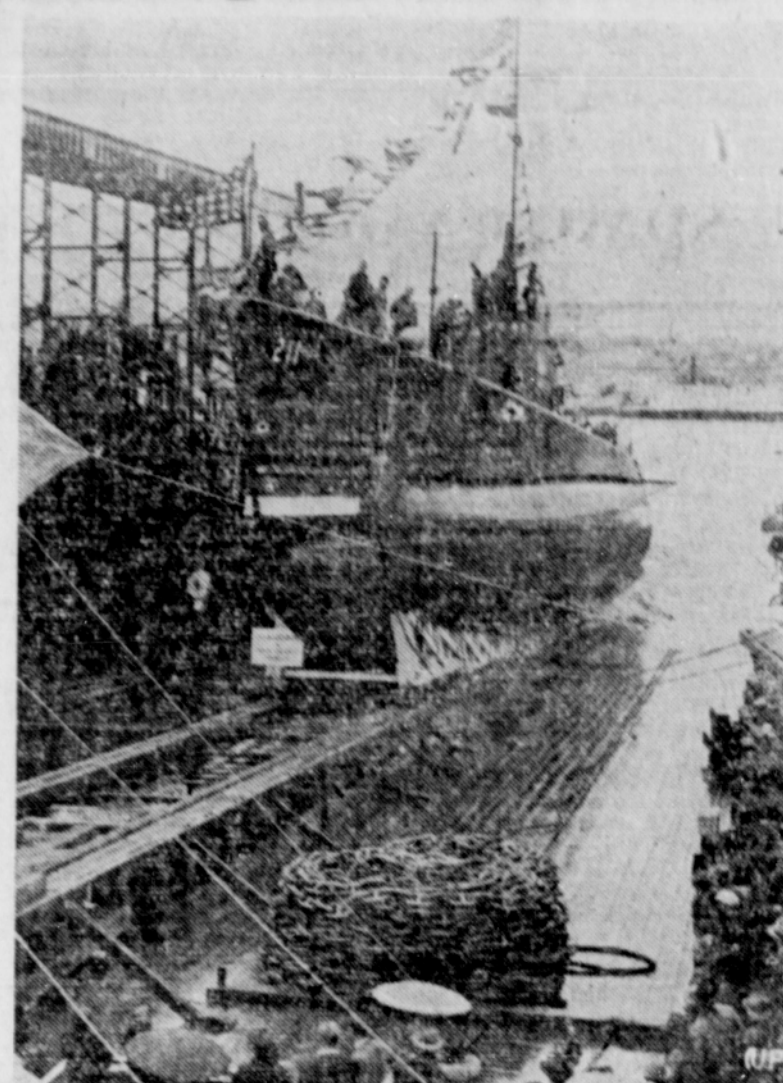
The Footlighters, which is the new name of the dramatics club, spent their entire club period having tryouts for the one-act play, "Antic Spring."

Telephone Repair To Be Taught CCC Boys at Reedsport

Telephone repair and construction will be taught CCC enrollees at Camp Reedsport, Oregon, as a part of the state's national defense training program, under arrangements recently completed by which the state national defense commission will take over a school in this subject established several weeks ago at the camp, according to Max Dudley, Lane County Public Welfare Commission Administrator.

First established as a special school by the Vancouver Barracks CCC District, the project will train enrollees for national defense signal corps work, and at the same time enable them to qualify for work at telephone construction and repair in civilian life.

Robert S. Sheehey, who for several years has been a "trouble-shooter" and combination man for the West Coast telephone company, is the instructor. Enrollees attending, 15 in number, were selected from the entire Vancouver Barracks district, on the basis of their qualifications to receive the special instruction.

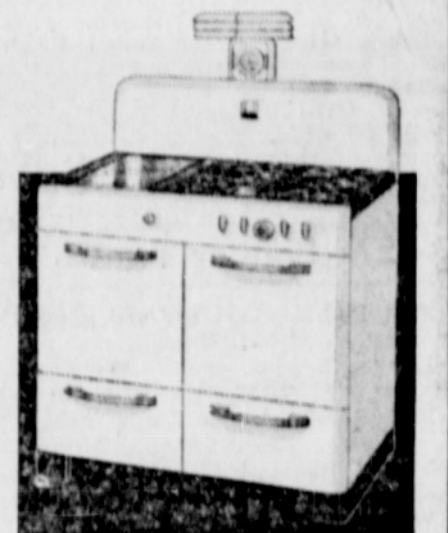
Several hundred dollars worth of equipment has been installed, including a switchboard and other materials that would commonly be used in such work. The complete course of instruction covers 4½ months, with enrollees spending a minimum of 15 hours per week in classwork.

ARGENTINA TO SEND U. S. 300,000 BOXES OF PEARS.

A limitation of 300,000 boxes of pears shipped to the United States from Argentina has been arranged for the current season, according to word received at Oregon State college from the Federal Marketing service. Last season about 265,000 boxes of pears were shipped to this country and Oregon growers have been conducting a campaign to cut off or curtail such shipments this season.
