Baked Carmel Custard.

¼ cup sugar
2 cups scalded milk
3 eggs
4 tbsps sugar
½ tsp salt
½ tsp vanilla
Caramelize the ¼ cup of sugar and add to the scalded milk. Mix 4 tbsps sugar, eggs, salt and vanilla and combine with the milk. Pour into custard cups or baking dish set in pan of hot water and place in a slow oven (300 deg.) until firm. A knife blade run into the center of the custard will come out clean.
