LONDON 4-H MOTHERS CLUB FORMED.

A group of mothers of 4-H club members in the London school, met on Wednesday afternoon at the home of Mrs. Leon M. Morton to organize a 4-H Mothers club. The purpose of the organization is to make for a better understanding of work done by club members between the mothers and club leaders. Discussions of various phases of club work will be taken up at regular meetings with actual work being done by the mothers to aid them in home instruction in different projects.

It was voted to hold meetings every first and third Wednesday afternoons of each month, with meetings at the homes of the members in alphabetical order. It was also decided that membership should not be restricted to mothers of club members, but to include those interested in 4-H club work and leadership.

ARCHERS IN TELEGRAPHIC SHOOT.

Followers of archery may be interested in the results of the telegraphic shoot underway by a number of clubs over the state. The telegraph shoot in the archery clubs is operated much in the same manner as the shoot operated by the various rod and gun clubs over the state.

In the absence of a winter shooting ground here two members of the local archery club have been shooting at Eugene. Forrest Lemley, a former resident, employed in Eugene, was best among the Oregon men in the tabulations of the first telegraphic shoot. According to results issued in the Oregonian of Monday, Lemley led the men of the state with a score of 756, among the 44 men's teams competing and this ranked him 28th in the nation. Bill Collins, shooting with the Eugene club, didn't do so bad. He was fourth among the men, shooting a score of 748.

Classes in Sheet Metal Work to Be Given at Vocational School

Training classes in sheet metal work will be given twenty-four hours a day at the Eugene Vocational school.

This sheet metal course is open to high school graduates of eighteen to twenty-five years of age, or if not a graduate of a high school, two years apprenticeship in metal work and two years high school will be accepted.

The course is given according to standards set up by the Boeing Aircraft Company of Seattle, and a great many young men who have recently completed the course have been employed by the company. Detailed information concerning this course, as well as other courses given at the Eugene Vocational school, can be obtained at the local State Employment Office.
