WILDLIFE FEDERATION TO MEET AT COLLEGE AGAIN.

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A second two-day meeting of the Oregon Wildlife federation has been called by President W. J. Smith to meet at Oregon State college February 13 and 14. This second general meeting of the federation was arranged tentatively at the annual conference late in November.

Aside from considerable organization business of the federation itself, items to be taken up include a consideration of bills before the present legislature dealing with wildlife conservation and related matters in this state, says Smith.

President Smith reports that following the fall conference, when action was taken urging the sale of land around Summer lake for a public shooting ground and refuge, the state land board has approved such sale. Smith is asking that each branch of the federation have at least one delegate at the February meeting.

Wagner Addresses Coast Lumber Ass'n



Corydon Wagner, president of the West Coast Lumbermen's association at Tacoma, Washington, last Friday addresses the association, using as his subject, "Is the Lumber Industry Prepared to meet the Challenge of 1941." There is no lumber famine, President Wagner declared. Cut-over lands are now producing a growth equal to half the present drain. When the stagnant mature forests are cut over, the future growth will exceed the present drain by four per cent, the speaker said.

"The challenge of 1941 is to return the lumber industry to its proper place in the esteem of the American people. . . . It involves rebuilding confidence in our products, in the future of our industry, and in the spirit of private enterprise," Mr. Wagner declared.
