Teutsch, assistant director of extension.

In the following period the Millers couldn't penetrate the tight Grove defense and so collected only four points, on a howitzer by Todd and a tip-in by Frye. Meanwhile the Lions were hitting a fair percentage of the shots to bring their total up to 21 against 5 for the Millers.

The second half was the inevitable rough, fast breaking type of ball with 14 fouls being called on both teams.

In the final forum the Millers doubled their score but the lead was too large to overcome.

A total of 21 fouls was called, 15 of which were on the Cottage Grove team but only two players, Thompson of Springfield and G. Dugan of the Lions, were ejected from the game.

Langston, fast breaking forward, was high point man with 10 points, but John Minor played both an outstanding offensive and defensive game for the Grovers.

Lee Todd, diminutive Springfield guard, was their spark plug throughout the game.
