BUTTER SCORING SHOWS FINE QUALITY PRODUCT.

Butter of the finest quality yet found at one of the state department of agriculture's regulatory butter scorings was handled in the February scoring. The scoring includes butter samples from every section of the state and from all sizes and classes of creameries. Samples are picked up by the department district men, sent to Salem and scored "blind". "The department is greatly gratified with the quality of butter picked up this time and feels that real progress is resulting from the dairy products quality improvement work in the state." A. W. Metzger, chief of the division of foods and dairies commented in reviewing the results of the scoring.
