40,000,000 Feet of Timber in County Is For Sale by O. and C. Adm. on March 11

It has been announced by W. H. Horning, Chief Forester of the Oregon and California Revested Lands Administration that the General Land Office of the Department of the Interior will offer 40 million board feet of timber for sale in Lane County on March 11, 1941. This timber is included in a larger sale of 128 million board feet valued at \$287,785.50 which is being offered for sale on the former grant lands on that date in several of the western Oregon counties.

Seventy-five percent of the gross receipts from timber sales each year is returned to the counties where O. and C. lands are located. Lane County received \$89,594.13 as its proportionate share of the 1940 income. This amount, added to a net return of twenty-four cents per acre in lieu of taxes.

The O. and C. Administration is managing the grant lands on a sustained yield basis so that a continuous production of timber will always be maintained. Timber removal is not permitted to exceed the annual growth as computed for the O. and C. properties.

Under this plan, Lane County will continue to receive an income from O. and C. lands without interruption during the various stages of timber development from small seedlings through the stages of saplings, poles, piling and mature saw timber. A proportion of the lands will always be in each of these various stages. The O. and C. lands will be protected from fire as completely as possible and kept growing another crop of timber.

FAKERS IMPERSONATE SALVATION ARMY WORKERS.

The Portland Better Business Bureau has released a state-wide warning urging citizens to be on the lookout for fakers who solicit funds by impersonating Salvation Army Workers.

The Bureau reports that in several recent instances such imposters have been discovered operating in Oregon communities. These men are said to be garbed in uniforms so similar to those of the Salvation Army that the casual observer is unlikely to detect the difference, and although they represent no recognized agency, they are believed to have collected substantial amounts from well intentioned, but unobserving, donors.

One of these operators, when investigated in an Oregon town recently was found to have in his possession a letter, apparently from a superior, in which he was instructed to "clean up Oregon and then hurry on to California." The warning points out that all

\$19,462,160 Asked For Oregon Work

Recommendations for the expenditure in 1942 of \$19,462,160 for Bonneville power installation, maintenance and new work on rivers and harbors of Oregon and Washington were contained Monday in the annual report submitted by the United States army engineers at Washington, D. C. from Portland.

The Bonneville project alone called for \$7,170,000.

In addition, other millions were recommended for expenditure on flood control projects through the vast watersheds of the Cascade and Coastal range.

Some of the heaviest expenditures recommended for maintenance work included \$230,000 for the Coquille river; Coos Bay, \$615,000; Umpqua river, \$470,000; Columbia river at the mouth, \$355,000, and an additional \$820,000 along the lower Willamette and Columbia below Vancouver and Portland and \$60,000 for the Willamette river at Willamette Falls.

In Washington, an appropriation of \$1,770,000 was recommended for maintenance at Grays Harbor and on the Chehalis river; Neah Bay, \$1,000,000 for new work, and \$150,000 for work on the Seattle harbor and Lake Washington ship canal.

Flood control recommendations included an additional \$62,000 for bank revetments and erosion preventive work along the McKenzie river in Lane county. The engineers also estimated \$696,195 could be profitably expended during 1942 for new work and bank protection along the Willamette river between Newberg and Eugene.

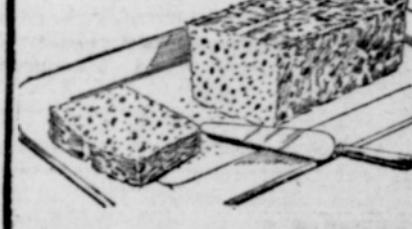

DATE CAKE

1 cup Carnation Milk
1 tsp. vinegar
1 1/2 cups flour
1 tsp. soda
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. cloves
3/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup fat (half butter)
1 cup sugar
1 egg
1 lb. dates, sliced
1 cup nuts

Add vinegar to Carnation Milk. Sift flour, then measure. Resift with other dry ingredients. Cream butter. Add sugar and continue creaming until sugar granules are almost dissolved. Add beaten egg, then add dry ingredients alternately with milk, beginning and ending with dry ingredients. Add dates and nuts with last few stirs. Pour into a loaf cake pan that has been lined with waxed paper. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) one hour.
