COUNTY LANDS SOLD.

The Lane county court turned over to the county treasurer Thursday a total of \$6,358.43, taken in on sales of country-owned lands during the period January 27 to February 21. A large portion of the sales involved timber land.

The county treasurer made the following segregation among various funds: general fund, \$3353.97; school districts, \$1517.83; union high school districts, \$339.95; county high school tuition fund, \$231.03; cities, \$637.92; College Crest water district, \$3.82; Lane county PUD, \$1.03; and forest fire patrol, \$272.98.
