

Mobile Camps to Insure Adequate Labor for Farms

With several additional mobile labor camps promised for Oregon's seasonal harvests this year, the agricultural committee of the advisory council of the state employment service Saturday laid plans for insuring an adequate supply of farm labor as an important part of the national defense program.

Representative of growers all over the state, the committee urged that agriculture be given the same priority as defense industries in securing workers to gather berries, fruits, hops and other seasonal crops. Resolutions that will be sent to leading national and state officials asked that CCC youths and those enrolled in vocational schools be released in case of labor emergencies.

E. C. Zeigler of Hood River, chairman, announced the step-up in the government's labor camp program, largely as a result of the committee's efforts. Both mobile and sub-mobile camps will be operated at Nyssa, Athena and Gresham, he said, while mobile units will come to Stayton, Merrill, Tule Lake, Independence, Grants Pass and possibly other points. (Eugene, Albany, Banks, Hood River and Joseph).

Approval of the Tolson congressional committee's investigation and report on migratory labor was voted by the committee, which favored passage of House Resolution 3372, which would extend the investigation to cover construction industries and the defense program. The resolution also would stamp out indiscriminate advertising in distant states by private employment agencies.

To prevent duplication of effort, the agricultural committee recommended its members be designated as a sub-committee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture on labor problems. Other federal and state agencies were recommended for furnishing extra money and personnel for temporary job offices and labor camps. Members present were: Harold Barnett of Pendleton; J. J. CCC Enrollees Start Sheet Metal Work Project Last Week

Active training for sheet metal work under sponsorship of the Oregon national defense committee was started this week by 17 CCC enrollees at Camp Zigzag.

Over \$1,500 worth of equipment has been placed in a specially constructed building by the Vancouver Barracks district to train the enrollees, who have been selected from the entire district on a basis of their special qualifications for the instruction.

Arthur Peters of Portland has been selected by the defense committee as instructor for the group. Although the class has been but newly organized, Peters reports the enrollees are taking to their work with enthusiasm and show considerable interest in learning each point thoroughly.

Preliminary instruction has consisted of acquainting the youths with the large stock of equipment purchased for the shop and enrollees have been better acquainted with such terms as "cornice brake," "bar bending machine," "crimping and beading machine," various types of shears and various mallets used by the trade.

Cooperation as one of the most important traits to be possessed by a shop worker has been stressed by Peters since the opening of the school. In a talk to his group on the opening night of the course, Peters said they would not only be taught the mechanical functions, but he would attempt to impress them with the necessity for doing the tasks they had learned to do carefully.

Many men are working today, he told the enrollees, because they could do the few things they had learned as they were told to do them and in cooperation with their employers and fellow workers.
