

Wheat Countries All in Same Boat As to Surpluses

American wheat growers are by no means alone in their efforts to control the world wheat surplus in producing exporting countries, according to Will Steen, chairman of the state AAA committee in Oregon, who has recently received word of steps being taken in Canada, Argentina, and Australia.

American wheat growers will no doubt be faced with the problem of deciding on the adoption of wheat marketing quotas, says Steen. A tentative date for the election has been set for May 31. If, as expected, the prospective wheat supplies by May 15 are above the limit set in the law of 1938, a marketing quota election must be held. If the quota is approved by growers, the government loans will continue, which constitutes one of America's chief methods of maintaining wheat growers' incomes while exercising a limit on production.

The Argentine and Canadian governments have been protecting their farmers by offering to buy their wheat outright, but this has led to difficulties. Argentine farmers are assured of about 55 cents a bushel and Canadian farmers of about 50 cents. Both governments say now they cannot continue to buy unlimited amounts of wheat unless foreign markets reopen. Canadian growers still have much of last year's crop piled up under temporary shelters because supplies far exceed storage capacity of the country.

Australia guarantees wheat farmers a price of about 56½ cents a bushel on an annual crop of not more than 140 million bushels. In return for this guarantee the growers must agree to market their wheat through the government and carry out certain practices designed to reduce wheat acreage.

In Argentina it is estimated that nearly 200 million bushels of wheat will be available for export in 1941. Canada will have more than 700 million bushels. Both of these amounts are considerably larger than supplies on hand a year ago. Because of drought Australia does not have large export supplies, but even so these cannot move freely through military blockades.

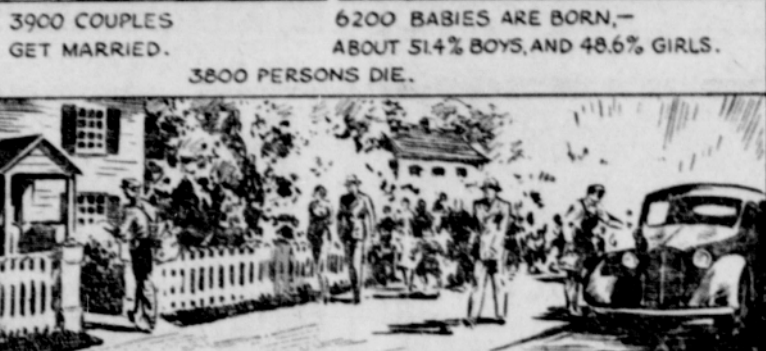

TO ASK CONTROL OF PRIVATE FORESTS.

WASHINGTON.—The administration, as a part of its preparedness drive, soon will ask congress for broad legislation providing for public regulation of more than 300,000,000 acres of privately-owned forest land, authoritative sources said Monday.

The object of such control, it was said, would be to prevent wastage of forest resources and to require private owners to observe cutting and replanting practices which would keep the land reasonably productive.

Mattress Making Project Is Setup

Applications for construction of mattresses using surplus cotton are now being taken by Nellie C. Lyle, home demonstration agent and cooperating community leaders. This program is designed for all low-income rural people who would not otherwise purchase a ready-made mattress or hire a commercial concern to process one for them and is not a relief program.

To be eligible a Lane county family must live outside the city limits of Cottage Grove, Springfield and Eugene, and its 1940 income must fall within the limitations that have been set up. Families are classified according to sources of income as follows:

The farm family—All 1940 income was gained from agricultural sources, and for a family of 1 to 4 members was not over \$500 net. When there are over 4 family members, this limit is raised \$50 for each member.

The part-time farm family—Part of the income was gained from farming sources. Farm operating expenses may be deducted from this portion of the income and if this net amount added to the gross income from other sources is not over \$500 for a family of 1 to 4 members, the family is eligible under the program. When there are more than 4 in the family, the limit is raised \$50 per member.

The non-farm family—All income is derived from other than agricultural sources and for 1 to 4 family members did not exceed \$500 gross during 1940. Again the limit is raised \$50 per member when there are more than 4 in the family.

Eligible families may apply for 50 pounds of cotton and 10 yards of ticking per mattress, but must do so before or on April 10. Other necessary equipment will be covered by a \$1.00 per mattress fee. The mattresses will be made by the applicant in community centers and it is expected that the construction work will be carried on during June and July.

In the Cottage Grove area applications are being taken by W. A. Hernerway, Lorane route; G. E. Finnelly, Disston route; Mrs. Jeanne Morton, Black Butte route; Mrs. W. J. Vaughn, Dorena; Mrs. Tillie Dugan, Walden, and Mrs. Zora Franklin, Lorane.
