GERMINATION DATE OF SEEDS IMPORTANT

Because some kinds of field and vegetable seeds do not retain their germinating power for an indefinite period after harvest, buyers should recognize that the year of germination shown on the seed label or tag is important. This is the tip given by Frank McKennon, chief of the plant division of the state department of agriculture. Under Oregon seed laws, seeds offered for sale here must be labeled with, among other things, the percentage of germination together with the year when the seed was tested.

The average duration of germination power in years in vegetable and field seeds is as follows:

Vegetable seeds — Asparagus, dwarf beans, pole beans, carrots, celery, collards, sweet corn, mustard, peas, spinach and tomato, three years. Parsley, turnip, okra salsify, one year. Onion, pepper and leek, two years. Garden beet, mangel beet, brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, eggplant, kale, pumpkin, radish, squash and turnip, four years. Cucumber, endive, muskmelon and watermelon, five years. Lettuce, six years.

Field seeds — Alfalfa, six to eight years. Kentucky and Canada bluegrass, three to four years. Bromegrass, five. Alsike clover, white clover, crimson clover, meadow fescue, cowpea, perennial rye grass and Italian rye grass, two years. Vetch, three years. Rape and red-top, six. Timothy and red clover, five to six. Orchard grass, two to three.

Lorane Pioneer Dies at Yakima

Milo Bushnell Stone, who initiated the movement to organize a union high school at Lorine, died recently at Yakima, Washington, where he had lived since 1911, when he left this vicinity.

Born in Chickasaw county, Iowa, August 22, 1863, he came west with his parents at the age of 12 years, settling near Portland. He attended Pacific University at Forest Grove and as a young man was engaged in stock raising in eastern Oregon.

Mr. Stone, who was 77 at the time of his death, will be well remembered by old residents in this district. He was Lorane's justice of the peace, president and stockholder of the Co-Operative Creamery, district road supervisor, owner of a small lumber mill and farmer during the 15 years he lived in this locality.

Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Ella Stone; three daughters, Mrs. Gladys Gano of Coquille, Oregon, Mrs. Ethel Denham, and Mrs. Eunice Mildred Lyon, both of Yakima; twelve grandchildren and four great grandchildren; one of whom was born in the week following his death.

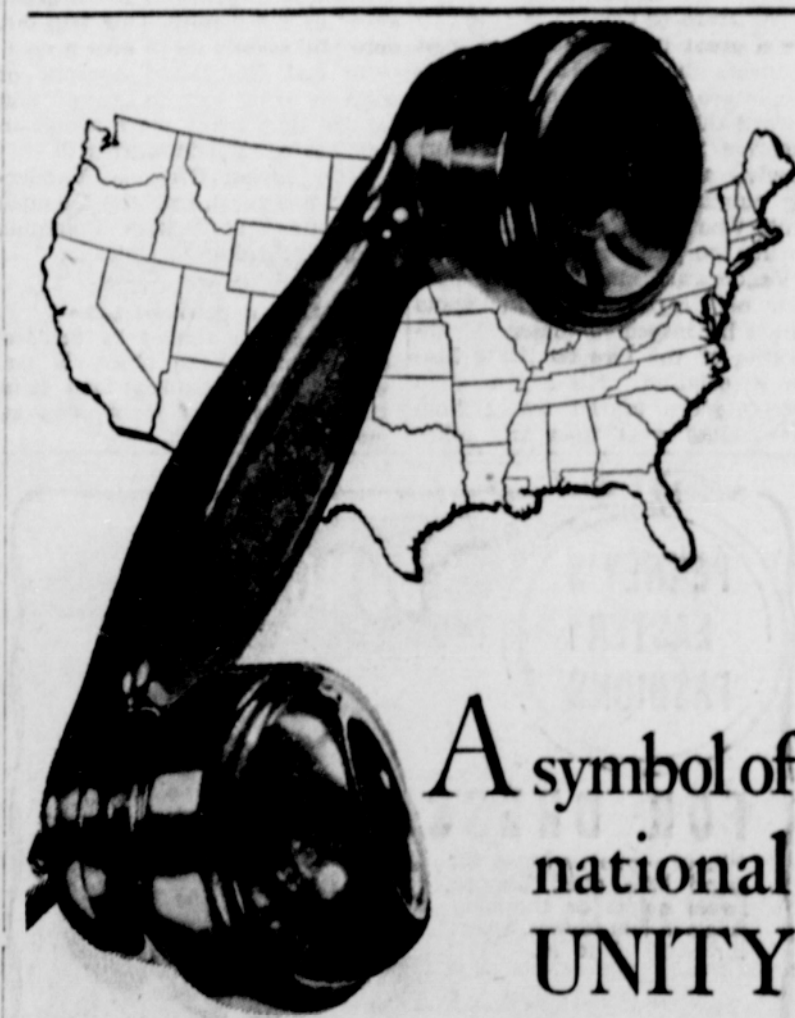
DUCK PLAYS SANTA IN SALEM CHIMNEY.
