

Juniors Win Inter Class Track Meet

By garnering six firsts, five seconds, four thirds and seven fourths for a total of 63 points, the junior class won the interclass track meet, held at Kelly field last Monday and Tuesday afternoon. The sophomores won second place with 48 points, followed by the seniors with 25 points and the freshmen with nine points. A highlight of the meet was the breaking of the quarter mile record by Lee Krause, sophomore, who won it in 53.9. The old record of 54.8 was set in 1938 by Vernon Lamm. Howard Jenkins, sophomore, garnered 12½ points for high point honors of the meet.

Grove Places Third.

The Cottage Grove track squad placed third behind Molalla and Beaverton in the B division of the Hayward Relays at Eugene Friday, April 11, on a four-man first place. The only point the Lions gained was a first place in the distance medley as Hopman, Hodker, Jones and Krause outdistanced their nearest rival, Beaverton, decidedly to glide home. The B division scoring was as follows: Molalla 15, Beaverton 11, Cottage Grove 5, Springfield 4, Hill Military 3, Chemawa 3, Coquille 2, University 1.

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C.G. Lions Trounce Creswell Nine by Lopsided Score

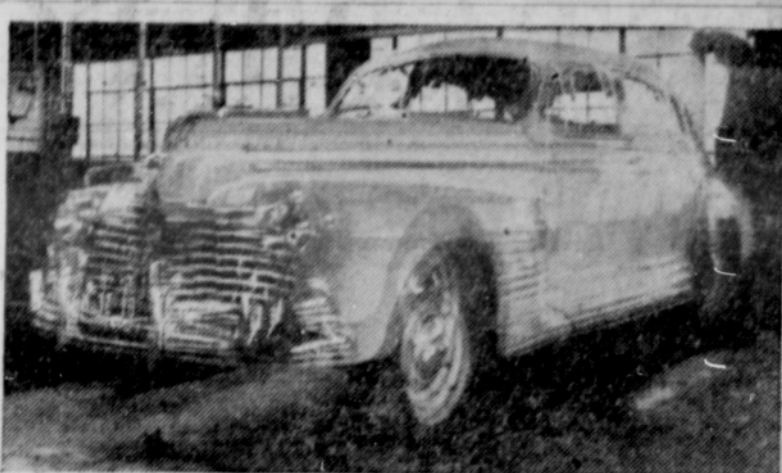

After nearly reaching the piling Scott tired and sunk out of sight. He was rescued by a neighbor, O. J. Noice, who was unable to locate the daughter. The child's body was recovered about 45 minutes later but artificial respiration by a physician and Coast Guardsman proved futile. Sarah and the boat were rescued farther down the stream.

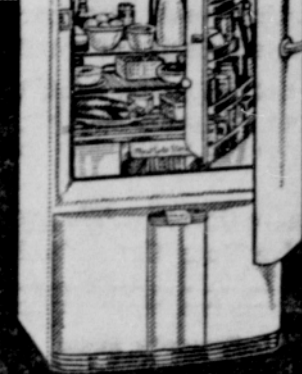
