Price Discounts For Milk Advised After OSC Survey

Recommendations for changes in the price structure for milk and cream in the important Portland metropolitan milk market have just been made by specialists of the Oregon State college experiment station, who were requested by the Oregon milk control board to make a scientific study of conditions.

The detailed report of the findings has just been issued as Station Bulletin 388, entitled "The Portland Metropolitan Milk Market." The study carried out in Portland by Dr. D. B. DeLoach, associate economist, and R. A. Stiner, research assistant of the experiment station, was the most comprehensive of a series of studies made throughout the state at the request of the milk board.

The study shows that sales of butterfat in the bottle and can milk trade for the period 1936 through 1939 decreased slightly more than 3 per cent in the Portland milk area, while production of milk in the area increased slightly more than 9 per cent. Various factors are considered responsible for the decrease in consumption, one being that, although the population increased slightly more than 5 per cent, the number of children between the ages of 4 and 19, who are the largest consumers of milk, decreased slightly more than 12 per cent.

The daily per capita consumption of milk in the Portland area averaged slightly less than a pint during 1939. This per capita consumption is high in relation to other cities for which data are available.

After studying production and distribution costs, and the various complaints that have been made by producers, consumers, and distributors regarding present regulations, it was concluded that the general structure of milk control in Portland is sound, but that

changes in detail can be made to encourage greater consumption. Among changes proposed are a quantity discount on purchases of three or four quarts of milk delivered daily, a store differential on the price of milk sold over the counter, and a lowering of cream prices, which are said to be out of line with the price of milk.

Report Show Big Wheat Surplus

Latest crop reports on the condition of winter wheat in America emphasize the necessity of a vote on wheat marketing quotas, according to Will Steen, chairman of the Oregon AAA committee.

The April crop report indicates that spring and winter wheat production plus the present carry-over will add up to nearly 1½ billion bushels. This is about twice as much as America normally consumes in two years. Other great wheat-producing countries also report big surpluses of unsold wheat, making the export outlook dark even without considering the war conditions which have cut off practically all chance of shipping wheat to countries which could use it.

The final proclamation of marketing quotas must be made prior to May 15, and will probably follow the May crop report. Already the tentative date for such a referendum, if called for, has been set for May 31. If the quotas are proclaimed and approved by growers, all farmers can sell all the wheat grown on their AAA acreage allotments. In other words, AAA cooperators will have nothing to worry about under the wheat quota system.

Farmers who have overplanted their allotments will have to store the excess or pay a penalty on it. Marketing quotas are a guarantee that all wheat growers will share in taking care of the surplus, says Chairman Steen.

National figures show that wheat growers are cooperating well with the wheat adjustment program. The indicated acreage this year will be somewhat less than 63½ million acres, which is remarkably close to the total acreage allotment of 62 million acres. The heavy prospective surplus has been brought about by the stoppage of practically all exports following several favorable production years.
