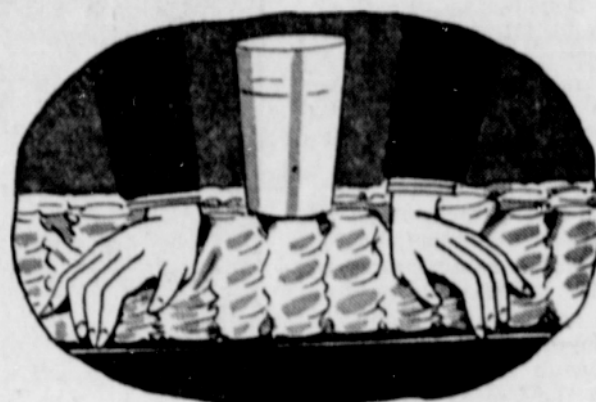
TO CELEBRATE 98TH ANNIVERSARY.
