

Farmshed Water Loans Available

Loans to provide spring development, wells, and purification safeguards for farmstead water facilities including water for livestock and domestic water and irrigation of not more than one acre of farm garden, have been authorized for farmers in Lane County according to word received this week by Dale R. Winn, county farm security administration supervisor, Postoffice building, Eugene.

"Eligibility will not differ materially from regular rural rehabilitation loans," Winn said. "The borrower must show that he is unable to obtain satisfactory financial assistance elsewhere. Applications for the present fiscal year ending July 1, should be made not later than May 10th and will be processed in the order they are received. After exhaustion of present available funds, applications will have to await further allocation of funds after July 1."

Farmstead water facilities loans can be made for the life of the facility not to exceed 20 years with interest at three percent, it was explained. Wherever approved engineering plans or technical assistance is necessary, services of the nearest Soil Conservation Service area offices will be available to borrowers. Loans under this authorization cannot be made to provide plumbing for the house or barn.

"There is a particular need in this district for development of deep wells for household use and this program should help meet the need," said Winn. "Applications for farmstead water loans or farmers wishing more detailed information should contact the county FSA office."

TRAILER SCALES FOR 4-H CLUB WORK PROVE VALUE.

A new trailer scale unit for use with 4-H clubs in the central Willamette valley is now under construction in the agricultural engineering department at Oregon State college, and will be ready for use in the early summer. This unit, expected to cost about \$200, is being financed by the Willamette Valley Production Credit association.

The idea of building a set of livestock scales into a trailer to be taken from farm to farm to weigh 4-H club livestock was originated here in Oregon about seven years ago. The first such trailer was financed by the Congress hotel at Portland and is still in use after covering some 50,000 miles of roads in Malheur, Baker, Union and Walla Walla counties.

Since that time units have been built in Harney, Klamath, Jackson, Lane and Sherman counties, and one unit which serves both Gilliam and Wheeler counties.

These portable scales provide frequent opportunity for livestock club members to weigh their animals and keep records of gains and compare them with the others, says L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader. This in turn has greatly improved the quality of the club work in livestock production. The idea has been adopted in other states and frequent requests for plans are received at the college.

Oregon Has Skill Labor Available For Nat'l Defense

Oregon has registered 229 machine shops, 13 woodworking shops, 40 sheet metal shops, and 39 foundries as available for production of defense materials in the state of Oregon, according to the inventory of productive facilities just completed by the Oregon Economic Council.

The inventory discloses that these shops have a total idle capacity of 3035 hours per day and would require 11,670 skilled men to man them on a twenty-four hour shift basis.

To meet this demand, the inventory of skilled labor completed by the Board of Mobilization of Labor January 1st, shows that there are 15,845 available mechanics of various skills who could supply the needed man power.

In addition to this, 38 of the shops reported apprentice training or vocational education courses which will make available additional skilled or semi-skilled men this summer and autumn.

Of the 229 machine shops, 147 were outside the city of Portland. Those machine shops registered 900 production tools operated by 974 workmen, while the shops were idle 1627 hours per day. 2080 skilled men would be needed to place them on a twenty-four hour shift while the labor necessary shows 7089 skilled men available to man the machines.

E. B. MacNaughton, president of the First National Bank of Portland and chairman of the Oregon economic council, in an effort to put these machines to work, called a meeting in Portland for April 18th.

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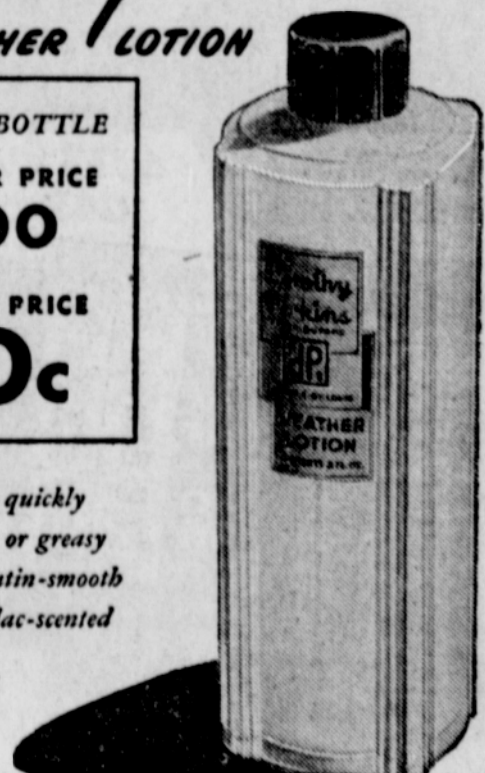
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
