The pageant gives the story of the history of our country beginning with the Indians and following through important historical events to our country as it is today. The program will include the following: Indians; the Colonial Period, with the landing of the Pilgrims and the first Thanksgiving Day; the Birth of a Nation, which will include George Washington, Valley Forge, Betsy Ross and making of the American Flag; the Westward Movement—Lewis and Clark, Daniel Boone, Sacajawea, settlers, mountain men, trappers; the Gold Rush; the Civil War, with the negroes, the southern whites and Abraham Lincoln; the Gay Nineties; the Melting Pot; the World War; and home life in Oregon as it is today.

Mrs. Thum is general chairman for the afternoon program presented by the two schools and is assisted by the Misses Newman, Olson, Schneider, Sweeney and by Mr. Newton and committees of students from various classes. The pageant is an original presentation, developed from the various units which have been taught during the year in the classes. Junior Langston and Howard Harpole from the high school will be in charge of games, races and stunts to be played during this time.
