Nat'l Employment Week May 4 to 10

In a concerted drive to give further recognition to older workers in the emergency production program, National Employment Week will be observed May 4 to 10 with special attention to Employment Sunday opening the week.

Governor Charles Sprague in a statement released today urged cooperation of all civic, fraternal, labor and industrial organizations. Under the sponsorship of the American Legion, the employment week has grown in importance, centering in recent years around the placement activities of the federal-state employment service.

President Roosevelt's proclamation asked that employers take full advantage of the facilities of the nation-wide network of 1500 employment offices in calling the available manpower.

In this state O. E. Palmateer of Salem, chairman of the American Legion's employment committee, has requested 119 post representatives to cooperate with all possible agencies in calling notice to the problem of jobs for men past 40. Jim Eckley and William Scharack are handling the area around Portland, while other chairmen are being named in other districts. Radio, press and pulpit will be asked to help.

Chamber of Commerce members heard the last round of the municipal versus privately owned utilities at the luncheon program Tuesday after the municipal side was presented by Ray Trask the previous week. L. C. Schroeder, local manager of the Mountain States Power Co., gave a brief history of the Mountain States Co. and told of the continual rate reduction made in rates here, since he came to the district in 1929. Comparison was also made in the rates effective in other towns that have taken Bonneville energy with the present rates in Cottage Grove.

H. W. Lombard, local attorney, also spoke briefly on the same question, telling why he favored privately-owned utilities.

Bob Daugherty, representative of the sophomore class presented Lorraine Voss, sophomore candidate for May queen, and spoke briefly in behalf of the class.

The proposition to subscribe to a fund for the erection of large signs along the Pacific highway to

draw traffic over the highway was discussed. Cottage Grove has been asked for \$150.00 as its share of the expense. No definite action was taken on the matter.
