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Open-face Olive Biscuits

2 cups sifted flour 1/2 cup milk
2 teaspoons baking powder (about) 1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup stuffed olives, sliced
1/2 teaspoon Spry (vegetable shortening)

Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Cut in Spry until mixture is as fine as meal. Add milk, mixing to a soft dough. Knead lightly about 20 seconds.

Roll dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with biscuit cutter and place on baking sheet. Bake in very hot oven (450° F.) 12 minutes.

Split hot biscuits, spread each half with mayonnaise and cover with sliced olives. Makes 1 dozen biscuits.

"PROBATION AFTER DEATH" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 27.

The Golden Text was, "God hath both raised up the Lord, and will also raise up us by his own power" (I Cor. 6:14).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "If in this life only we have hope in Christ, we are of all men most miserable. For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death" (I Cor. 15:19, 22, 26).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "In the illusion of death, mortals wake to the knowledge of two facts: (1) that they are not dead; (2) that they have passed the portals of a new belief. Truth works out the nothingness of error in just these ways" (p.251).
