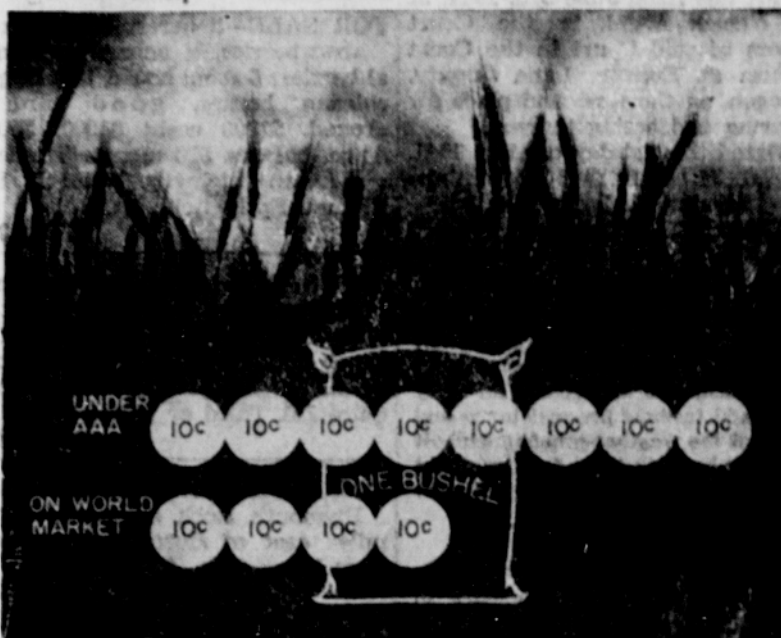

AAA Boosts Wheat Income



The U. S. Department of Agriculture says that American farmers who cooperated in the 1940 AAA program received a net return of nearly 80 cents a bushel for their wheat. Compared with a probable return of 40 cents a bushel or less had they been dependent entirely upon the world market. The national farm program aids wheat growers with crop loans, parity and conservation payments, crop insurance, and an export program.

SPRING ENDS FOREST PLANTINGS.

Nearly a quarter of a million forest tree seedlings were planted on state forests by the various crews that have been engaged in that work for the past month. Advanced spring weather made it necessary to discontinue planting on April 8. Forests on which the work has been undertaken include the Tillamook County State Forest, Hamlet Experimental Forest, Lincoln County State Forest and an eighty-acre tract in Columbia county which has been set aside for experimental planting. The plantings have consisted almost exclusively of Douglas fir, Port Orford white cedar, western red cedar and Sitka spruce.—Forest Log.

DISTRIBUTE WEIGHT.

Even distribution of weight in the car is important, according to the Emergency Road Service of the Oregon State Motor association. If a driver weighs about 150 pounds and his one passenger occupies the left rear seat, their combined weight is approximately 300 pounds. This uneven distribution of weight affects the springs on the left side of the car. It also increases swaying on curves at high speed.
