

Mountain States Power Company Cuts Electric Rates Effective June First

The Willamette Valley division of the Mountain States Power Co., of which Cottage Grove is a part, will benefit from a rate reduction which will be effective June 1, under an order announced Monday by State Utilities Commissioner Ormond Bean. Unique feature of the new rate plan is a form of billing which tells the customer how much of his bill is taxes.

In the Willamette Valley Division of the Mountain States (roughly all the territory from Cottage Grove to points north of Albany) the reduction amounts to \$98,200 annually. Approximately 23,000 customers will receive cuts; \$67,000 to residential users, \$25,700 to commercial lighting users, \$5,500 to nineteen municipalities now receiving service from the company.

Reductions in the new residential schedule will range up to 17 percent on a monthly bill. Under the former schedule the cost of 250 kwh amounted to \$7.50, while under the new schedule it will amount to \$6.13.

The rates follow a form of expression new in Oregon, but extensively used in the Tennessee Valley area. In the new rates the ration of direct rates paid by the company to the income dollar is used as a surcharge. Residential rates are as follows:

3.2c per kwh for the first 50 kwh per month;
2.6c per kwh for the next 50 kwh per month;
1.7c per kwh for the next 100 kwh per month;
1.3c per kwh for the next 100 kwh per month;
9c per kwh for the excess kwh per month.

Minimum monthly bill—85c for lighting and small appliances.

To this is added 16.75 per cent, the ratio of direct taxes to the income dollar.

The commercial lighting schedule offers comparable reductions in that bracket of service, and the reduction in the street lighting

ates to the nineteen cities will amount to substantially 20 percent. The change in the street lighting rate not only calls for a reduction in the rate but an increase in the wattage of the street lights now being used. The size of the lamps generally used in Cottage Grove is at the present time 60 watts. Under the new schedule they will be increased to a 100 watt lamp. This will result in better illumination of streets in the city with lower cost to the city.

Car Production Cut 20 Percent

WASHINGTON—The office of production management Saturday fixed next year's automobile production at 4,224,152 motor vehicles and notified each manufacturer what share of the total he may produce.

The order effectuated the industry's recent agreement with OPM to reduce the output by 20 percent to conserve materials and labor for arms production. It applies to the 1942 model year which begins this August 1.

"The scheduled reduction in material requirements has been accomplished," the OPM said, "as the final total allotted amounted to 4,224,152 motor vehicles against 5,289,972 manufactured in the preceding year or a reduction of 1,065,820 units equaling 20.15 percent."

Despite the large amounts of critical materials which will be saved by the cut in the production, the OPM asked the industry to make "the greatest economy" in the use of neoprene, nickel, chromite, magnesium, ferro-tungsten, nickel steel, zinc, copper and aluminum.
