State Game Men To Cooperate With Forest Service

The regulations governing cooperation between state fish and game officials and the forest service have been revised for the purpose of promoting game management on the national forests, according to L. H. Douglas, assistant regional forester, U. S. forest service, Portland, Oregon.

Cooperative agreements between appropriate state and forest service officials now are on a better basis. All phases of control and management will be handled cooperatively, with the states in immediate control of hunting, trapping, and fishing, and the forest service placing emphasis on the management of the land. Bringing wild life population into balance with the food supply, and adjusting and maintaining the sex ratio on the cooperative areas are among the projects that will be undertaken. These adjustments will be made under definite plans and in accordance with state laws.

Without close cooperation between the two agencies neither the wild life nor the habitat can be satisfactorily managed, according to Douglas.

Quota Election May 31 Believed Vital to Oregon

Wheat farmers of Oregon as well as other states will be called upon May 31 to decide by ballot the nation's future policy in regard to wheat, announces Will Steen, Umatilla county wheat farmer and chairman of the state AAA committee. The wheat quota proclamation scheduled for May 10 will be followed by the nationwide referendum on the last day of the month.

Each wheat community in the country will have its polling place where three local wheat farmers will be in charge of the referendum. The county committee will be responsible for posting public notices of the election and for seeing that each eligible farmer has an opportunity to cast a secret ballot.

Every farmer who will be affected by the wheat quota is eligible to vote in the election, points out Chairman Steen. So far as known now, this will mean that every grower who is listed as having an average production of 200 bushels or more may vote. A proposal is pending in congress to change the provision so the quota will apply only to those who produce 15 or more acres of wheat, but action on this was not completed the first week in May.

A two-thirds vote of the farmers taking part in the referendum is necessary to approve the quota plan. As a general rule, the commercial growers of wheat are strong advocates of the quota plan says Chairman Steen. Failure of the quotas would be tragic for most commercial growers, because the law requires that if quotas are not approved when supplies reach their present levels the government is prevented from making loans. Without the support of the loan program it is agreed that wheat prices would sink to ruinous levels.

Smaller wheat producers will also profit by the plan, Steen believes. Every grower who plants within his acreage allotment will be able to market his wheat just as before, and at much better prices than if the quota plan is turned down and the loan support is lost.

WEST COAST TO ADD FOREST ENGINEERS.

EUGENE, Oregon.—Two forest engineers will be added on June 1 to the staff of the West Coast Lumbermen's and Pacific Northwest Loggers' Associations, the Joint Committee on Forest Conservation announced today. The committee's program, steadily developed since 1933, will be further enlarged in succeeding months, the announcement said.

"The broad objective of this program is to maintain a continuous supply of forest materials for the future support of the payrolls and people of the Pacific Northwest," stated W. G. Tilton, Conservation Director for the Associations. "This means more intensive application of sound forest practices which are already in force on operations representing the greater part of Douglas fir log production.
