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Loggers Subject to The Permit Law

SALEM, OREGON — Effective May 15, the first day of the closed season, all woods operations in western Oregon that are subject to the provisions of the operators' permit law, with the exception of a small part of southern Douglas County and all of Josephine and Jackson counties, will be required to close down when the humidity reaches 30 per cent, according to notification sent out to operators today by State Forester N. S. Rogers. The notification also requires that during periods of high winds the operations must be discontinued when the humidity reaches 35 per cent.

"The logging of Oregon timber has doubled since the law of 1932," states Mr. Rogers, "and this means a tremendous increase in the hazard through additional men in the woods and the use of power driven equipment. Yet continued production to meet the demands of the defense program is highly essential and the department does not care to handicap the output through general closures of all logging operations for periods of several days duration during high hazard periods. It is hoped that through the cooperation of the industry in observing the regulation that it will not be necessary to invoke the general closure law."

Mr. Rogers also stated that the inspection force of the state forestry department had been increased from thirteen to seventeen men, a move found necessary because of the immense increase in logging activities in the state. He indicated that the duties of these officials will be to check all logging operations at frequent intervals during the summer to see that fire precautionary measures are taken by the various operators. Attention is also called to the fact that burning permits will be required.

The ancient English game of cricket was known in the Fourteenth century. The first rules were made in 1774.

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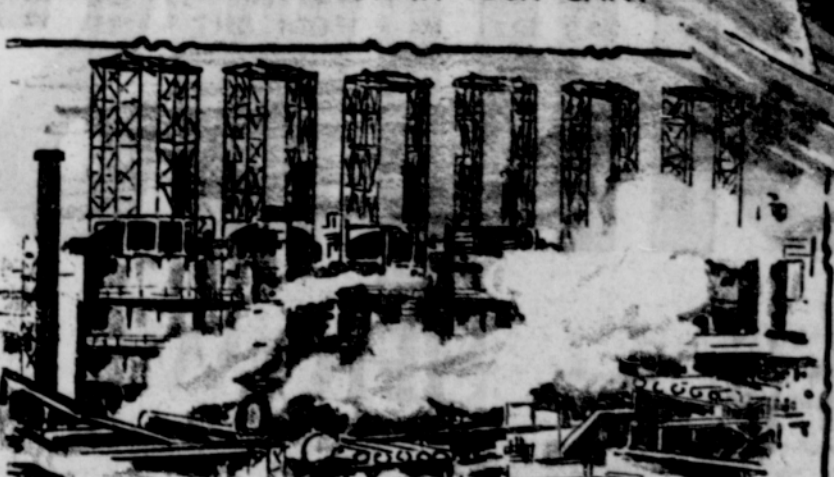
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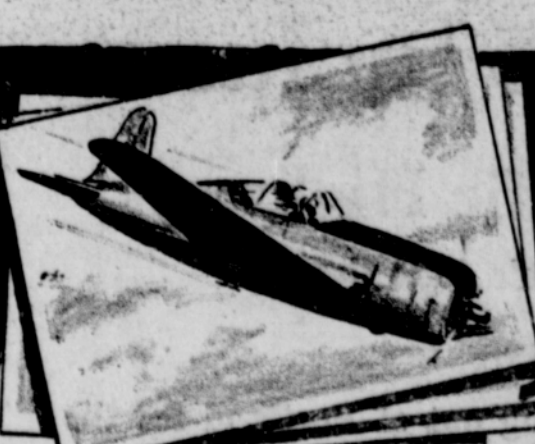
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
