

Safety Rules for Vacation Season

Declaring that the summer vacation season, June, July and August is a dangerous period for children so far as traffic accidents are concerned, Chief of Police Myron Perry today urged drivers and children to cooperate in the interest of traffic accident prevention during the coming vacation season.

During the three months of the vacation season last year, six children in the 5 to 14 age group were killed in traffic accidents and 178 were injured, according to figures supplied Chief Perry by Earl Snell, secretary of state. Thus this three month period resulted in 24 percent of all fatalities and 30 percent of all injuries in this age group for the entire year.

"Of special significance is the fact that all children killed during that period last year were victims of pedestrian or bicycle accidents while 48 percent of those injured were in this classification," the chief said. "These figures emphasize the need for drivers to be careful in areas where children are playing and on their part, children need to be more careful in their play and while riding bicycles."

Chief Perry listed these suggestions for traffic safety during the summer vacation months:

Drivers.

1. Reduce speed past playgrounds, keep alert for children entering or leaving.
2. Watch for children playing in residential districts, particularly at dusk and after dark.
3. When passing bicycle riders, be sure to sound your horn to warn them of your action.
4. Encourage your own children to play in vacant lots or playgrounds, not in the street.
5. For general safety, watch your speed on highways, be careful at intersections in cities and slow down at night.

Children:

1. Play only in vacant lots or designated playgrounds, never play in the streets.
2. Don't step out into the street from between parked cars.
3. When walking along the highway, always walk on the left, facing approaching traffic. When cars approach, step off the paved surface till they pass.

Bicyclists:

1. Never ride two or more abreast, always ride single file.
2. Ride on the right side of the street or road.
3. When turning, make proper arm signals and be sure no cars are near.
4. Observe all traffic signals and signs.
5. Don't make sudden turns across the path of traffic.
6. Don't ride double.
7. Keep your bicycle in good mechanical condition.
8. Park your bikes at bicycle racks whenever possible.
9. For night riding, be sure you have a good front light, an efficient rear reflector and wear something white, such as a white sweater or cap.
10. Know and observe the rules pertaining to bicycle operation in your community.

News Briefs

President Roosevelt asked congress Tuesday for \$886,000,000 relief appropriation for the fiscal year beginning July 1. This amount was \$109,000,000 below the budget estimate. The sum will provide a monthly average of 1,000,000 on the work project relief rolls. The defense program has taken up the slack in the employment situation and will have an important bearing on this department in the future months.

A reduction of approximately \$6,980 was made in the non-high school budget at Eugene Tuesday at a board meeting, the total expenses for the coming year are estimated at \$69,945 as compared with \$75,925 last year. At the board meeting a recommendation was made that the schools begin September 22, to allow pupils to assist in harvesting crops.

Thirty-one county residents were notified yesterday to serve on the June term of the circuit court, which convenes June 2 at 10 a. m. Among local residents summoned to serve were: W. F. Allen and Nelson Bemis.

INSPECT ROAD TO BOHEMIA.

County Engineer P. M. Morse and Walter Holland, county commissioner, were down Tuesday inspecting the road into the Bohemia district. The H. & H. Mines and others operating in the Bohemia section have requested that two very sharp curves accompanied by two, small bridges be changed or removed in order to permit the transportation of heavy equipment to the mines in that area.

Lane county has done some work in that area, in smoothing the roadway and the H. & H. Mines has widened the road in places by blasting, but further improvement in the road is necessary before it will adequately serve this section.

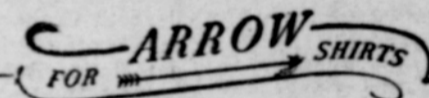
