

CCC Offers Education

"Young men who want to qualify for active participation in national defense can do no better than to accept a period of service and training in the Civilian Conservation Corps," according to James Frankland, assistant regional forester in charge of the division of engineering, U. S. forest service, Portland, Oregon.

"While there is no responsibility, either direct or implied, that a member of the corps will be required to perform actual military service in the armed forces as a result of his service in the Corps, there is abundant opportunity to qualify through training on the work projects for positions with the defense industries, to improve his physical well-being and, in many ways, to improve his working ability through actual work experience.

"The satisfaction of having an actual part in the conservation activities of the government at a time when these activities are so important to the all-out defense of the country is only one of the intangible benefits accruing to the enrollee.

"Vocational training or training on the job which has long been considered one of the major objectives of the CCC program, is in the times of national emergency being pointed toward those skills which will qualify for employment in defense work, and now affords one of the best opportunities for young men to prepare for such employment."

Hundreds of AFL and CIO machinists, milling about in strike at Bethlehem plant in San Francisco, were joined by machinists in 10 other plants in San Francisco-Oakland area to complicate national defense picture. Approximately 500 million dollars' worth of naval shipbuilding contracts were involved as men sought pay boost from \$1 to \$1.15 per hour, plus continuation of double time for overtime. Employers offered \$1.12 per hour.

L. J. Eppenbaugh has gone to Salem, having been appointed to work at the vocational office.

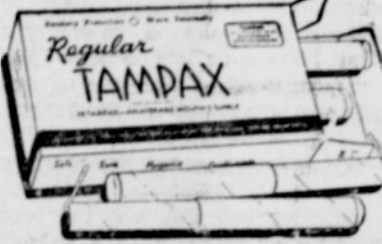
Mrs. Charles Peck left for a six week's trip. She will visit her daughter in San Francisco, and then go to Chicago, Illinois and Michigan before returning.

The show was moved early in the morning to an auction sale barn and all of the exhibits were under cover, although they were somewhat close for exhibition. All of the classes were filled and many fine exhibits did not receive any premium money.

Albert Stearns of Junction City won the champion pen of fat lambs on his Hampshires and received the cup presented by the Twin Oaks Builders' Supply company. Angus Leffler of Seio won champion fat lamb of a Shropshire lamb and received the cup presented by the Junction City branch of the U. S. National bank. The best pen of lambs was awarded Walter Hubbard of Monroe on his six Hampshire lambs.

Alice Glenn, the Lions club candidate for queen of the Fat Lamb show, was crowned Friday night at the Queen's Ball by Mark Woodruff, manager of the Portland Rose festival, and reigned over the show on Saturday, presenting the awards.

The Future Farmer Fat Lamb judges contest was won by the team from Albany. Corvallis placed second, Junction City third, and Eugene fourth. The 4-H class was won by a Linn county team.

The judges for the lamb show were O. M. Nelson, professor of animal husbandry, Oregon State college, and Claude Steusloff, of the Valley Packing company, Salem.

One of the highlights of the show was the dog-working demonstration, put on by Godfrey Priddy, manager of Glenwood Farms, Portland, with his Boarder Collie, Dougie. The dog worked slowly and was able to corral the sheep and do whatever he was asked of him without being rough, scattering the sheep, and keeping them on the course the entire time.

The Lamb Show was sponsored by the Junction City Lions club, the Merchants and the Lane County Fair association, and had exhibits coming from Linn, Lane, and Benton counties. The Lions club committee in charge of the show was Carey Strone, chairman; L. W. Seigman, R. R. Board, Stanley Green, secretary, and Ernest Kennedy, treasurer.
