## HALL SPEAKER AT CHURCH OF CHRIST.

Lieut. C. Vincent Hall, retired U. S. Army officer, will speak at the Church of Christ, Sixth and Gibbs, on both Sunday and Monday evenings. Lt. Hall was entertainer to the British forces that captured Jerusalem in the World War, by command of Gen. Allenby. As an archaeologist, he spent years in Egypt, gathering material and pictures, some of which are duplicated nowhere else in the world. That he is an effective Christian worker is evidenced by the fact that in his Jamaica mission station, there were over 1200 who confessed Christ in one eight-month period.

## Lane County Jury Indicts 9 Persons

The Lane county grand jury made a report Saturday forenoon at Eugene, returning nine indictments, one secret, in pending criminal cases. Defendants in all of the cases, except the secret indictment, are under arrest for the alleged crimes, or have been released on bail.

William Theodore Foust was indicted on two charges resulting from his arrest in connection with the burning of the Hell's Gate service station near Oakridge a few months ago. One indictment was arson and the other was for burning with intent to defraud.

Elias Omer Ankrom and Nick N. Derschon both were indicted for non-support.

Lloyd Hemmingson was indicted on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, as was Mrs. G. A. Kinyon.

H. E. Church was indicted on two charges of drawing a bank check with insufficient funds.

Circuit Judge G. F. Skipworth issued a bench warrant for the arrest of the person named in the secret indictment and set his bail at \$2500 upon apprehension.

## Five-passenger Coupe Is Popular Chevrolet Model

The increasing demand on the part of Chevrolet buyers has prompted the five-passenger coupe into second position among all body styles, surpassing the place held by the four-door sedan throughout most of the past decade, figures recently released by the division's Market Analysis department reveal.

Traditionally the leader, two-door sedans are still the No. 1 choice of the Chevrolet buying public, the figures show, with the always-popular four-door sedans now in third place. Fourth and fifth, respectively, are the business coupe and the cabriolet.

During the first quarter of 1941, two-door sedans accounted for 44.8 per cent of all passenger car sales, the Chevrolet business picture shows. Five-passenger coupes were 24 per cent of all sales; four-door sedans 22.9 per cent; business coupes 6.5 per cent, and cabriolets 1.6 per cent.

In the same period last year, two-door sedan sales amounted to 54.4 per cent of the total; four-doors, 24.3 per cent; business coupes, 11.2; five-passenger coupes, 8.3, and cabriolets 1.5.

A decade ago, in 1930, the figures ran like this: two-doors, 46.3 per cent; four-doors, 24.6; four-passenger coupes, 17; business coupes 7; phaetons, 3; and sport roadsters, 4.8 per cent.
