### JOKER CLUB.

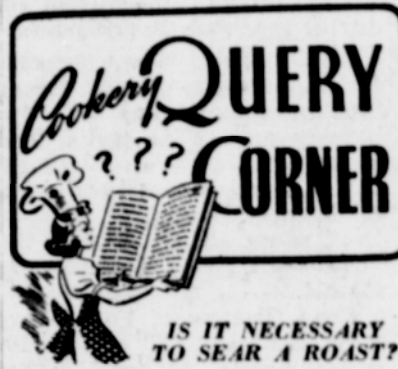
