

Trout Liberation Now in Full Blast

Liberation of trout in waters of Oregon is now on in full blast the Oregon State Game Commission announces, with crews operating in various sections of the state. Four new liberation trucks have been placed in service, all equipped with pumps that keep water in the tanks circulating, thus providing necessary oxygen required to keep the fish in good condition.

In addition to the large trucks, the Commission is also using two smaller three-fourth ton trucks, on which new portable tanks are being carried. Pack strings have also been placed in service to plant the waters of the high altitudes with fish.

One of the two portable tanks is equipped with a fan blower arrangement attached directly to the motor at the front end of the tank. This fan draws air down into the tank and forces it through the spray of water from the circulating system and on out through an opening at the rear. This fan serves to keep the oxygen content of the water at a higher level by forcing air in to the water continuously. A check is being made of the two small portable tanks, one against the other, to determine the effectiveness of the fan attachment. The new device was designed and constructed by Ray Kincaid, a commission employee.

Special pack cans to carry fish have been constructed for use on the horses of the pack string, and back pack cans are also available to the men who will plant fish in waters that cannot be reached easily by horses. The latter cans are built to fit on the back of a man. The first pack string went into service on May 26th in the Willamette National Forest where 16 lakes in the northern end of the forest are to be planted with both eastern brook and rainbow trout. The fish are being transferred from the Klamath hatchery to the Fall River hatchery to supply the pack train.

Recent liberations have been made in various sections of the state including: rainbow trout from Oak Springs hatchery, near Maupin; rainbow trout from the Klamath hatchery; native cutthroat from the Alsea hatchery; chinook salmon from the Federal Butte Falls hatchery; brood rainbow from the McKenzie hatchery and yearling rainbow from the Roaring River hatchery.

At the present time the crews are engaged in planting spring

rainbow 4 to 5 inches in length in eastern Oregon from the Oak Springs hatchery. Crews are also liberating small native cutthroat from the Bandon hatchery in high tributary streams of coastal waters in southwest Oregon. This is a thinning out process to enable the remainder of the stock to make a better growth.

Liberations planned for the immediate future include rainbow and eastern brook from the Union hatchery into waters of eastern and southeastern Oregon, large native cutthroat in waters of the Alsea river system from the Alsea station and yearling spring rainbow from the Klamath hatchery into the waters of south central Oregon.
