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Twenty-Seven Participate in Registered Shoot Here Sunday

J. B. Troeh of Eugene Wins Event No. 1; Event No. 2 Won By Miles Wicks; Two Local Shooters Win Honors.

Twenty-seven shooters participated in the registered shoot at the grounds of the Cottage Grove Rod and Gun club on 6th street Sunday, sponsored by the local Rod and Gun club. Five thousand rounds were fired at the event. Only two events were held, the 100 16-yr. targets and 100 handicap targets. The third event consisted of 12 pairs of double targets, which were not held. J. B. Troeh of Eugene won event No. 1 and broke 97 out of 100 targets. Event No. 2 was the 100 handicap targets which was won by Miles Wicks of Creswell with a score of 87. Among class A shooters, J. B. Troeh of Eugene won 1st; in the class B shooters, Harry Rentele of Cottage Grove and J. D. Tye of Eugene tied for 1st honors. In the class C, John Hurd of Eugene won 1st and in class D, H. M. Harpole of Cottage Grove won 1st. The individual scores were as follows:

Local Officers to Enforce New Laws

The new state speed law went into effect June 14th, superseding all other speed laws as well as city and municipal speed laws of the various localities of the state. The new law will designate speeds in certain areas, in the traffic on the highways, through the city and towns and past school buildings.

Myron Perry, chief of police, said yesterday that the new laws will be strictly enforced here. The new regulations are: speed not to exceed 25 miles in residential districts and 20 miles per hour in business district and in school zones. Markers designating speeds along the highway and in the various zones are expected to be erected at an early date.

Special attention was called to traffic on 6th street where a number of reports indicated a 60-70 mile speed was reached. This will be stopped Perry said.

September 8th Is Cottage Grove Night Over Station KOAC

The state highway commission is again sponsoring a series of broadcasts over station KOAC at Corvallis on Monday evenings and have invited the traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office to participate in this series. Broadcasts will be heard from 8:45 to 9:00 p. m.

In a letter to William Haldeeman, Cottage Grove mayor, Earl Snell has set aside the evening of September 8th for the city of Cottage Grove and has invited mayor Haldeeman to appear on the program or to send a representative to appear on the broadcast to tell the radio audience of the activity for safety which is being carried out here.

Queen, Princesses For South Lane Fair to Be Named

U. G. Jackson and Thomas L. McCullough, resident engineers at the Coast Fork dam were guests at the regular noon meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday. They said that the work was now in full swing. The crews were working twenty-four hours a day and seven days a week. Cement was being poured at a rapid rate and the ground work would get underway in a short time.

The Chamber passed a resolution to empower the committee to go ahead with its plans to select a queen and two princesses for the South Lane County fair which is to be held the next to the last Friday and Saturday of August in Cottage Grove. The highest number of votes will determine the queen and the next two candidates will be her princesses at the fair.

The girl who is chosen to be the queen of the local fair is to represent Cottage Grove as a princess in the royal court in the pageant at Eugene next month.

The committee announced that any organization wishing to sponsor a candidate would please contact N. J. Nelson at the post office. The clothes which the girls will need for these occasions will be furnished by the committee.

State Archery Shoot to Be Held Here July 4, 5, 6

The state archery association will hold its annual state shoot here July 4, 5, and 6. Bill Collins, vice president of the state association, announced Monday. The shoot will be held on the high school grounds. Previously officers had planned to hold the shoot on the Cottage Grove golf course. The event will end Sunday evening with a banquet and business meeting. Mr. Collins said the place of the banquet had not yet been planned inasmuch as there would likely be from 75 to 100 people attending.

The perpetual trophies of the association will likely be placed on display in the windows of local business houses a short time before the meeting. Any business man interested in displaying the trophies should see Mr. Collins.

Archery followers from all over the state are expected to attend including a big delegation from Portland. Further announcements of the shoot will be made as soon as plans are completed.

Rains Cause Damage To Oregon Cherries

Widespread damage to Oregon's cherry crop has been caused by recent rains, the state Department of Agriculture reported Monday at Portland.

Extensive losses of ripening black cherries were reported, with thousands of cherries split near Gresham. Damage to Royal Annes, most of which are not fully ripe, was said to be less serious.

At the same time the weather bureau forecast showers and clearing weather for the Northwest.

According to present plans of the board, an additional teacher will be employed as soon as the additional room is completed on the Mount View building.

Some discussion was held on the possibility of consolidating with the Cottage Grove elementary school system but it was decided to let the Mount View and Fairview consolidation stand.

In the annual election of directors, Mrs. Ed Voss was elected clerk. Claude Arne was elected director for a term of one year and Ed Voss was elected for a term of three years.

Largest 4-H Club Summer Session to End at Oregon State College Friday

The nation's largest 4-H club summer session neared its end on the Oregon State college campus this week as 2054 youngsters from every county in the state finished up their classwork and prepared to leave for home June 20. While there may be other places where more clubbers are gathered together for a few days, no state holds a two-week session with such a large number, according to H. C. Seymour, state club leader.

An indication of the classwork taken may be had from the fact that the girls alone had 64 different sections available, totaling 2048 hours of classwork during

the ten days of scheduled study. The sections and hours for boys were not quite as high but added materially to the total.

Tentative registration figures showed 1305 girls and 749 boys in addition to between 150 and 200 local leaders and extension workers who assisted with the session. The clubbers set up their own governing groups with representatives from each of the 32 fraternity and sorority houses and three dormitories on executive committees. The girls' executive committee was headed by Betty Cushman of Condon and the boys' executive committee by Brick Leever of Portland.

The Cottage Grove fire department has made its third suggestion in the way and means of removing fire hazards from Cottage Grove. These suggestions were made following a survey of the town several weeks ago.

RAINS DAMAGE HAY CROP.

Continuous rains have damaged the hay crop, most of which has been cut. Damage was more extensive south of here when practically the entire crop had been cut. The wet weather had not particularly hurt the cherry harvest which is now in full swing but has cut the strawberry crop short. The strawberry harvest has been ended except for a few scattered patches.

Construction at Coast Fork Dam Shows Progress

The construction continues at the unabated pace on the Coast Fork dam in the Hebron section. Concrete is being poured on the spillway 24 hours a day with three shifts of concrete workmen.

The contractor is getting ready to move dirt on the main earthen dam. Drillers are ready to start drilling and grouting operations preliminary to the construction of the main dam.

Hauling gravel from the Row river pit has been resumed. About 40,000 to 50,000 yards of gravel remain to be transported to the damsite before a sufficient quantity is obtained for all the concrete work.

Road construction on the east and west roads around the reservoir is still in the preliminary stage. Grading and graveling work will be resumed as soon as all bridges have been completed.

Wool and Lambs Bring Good Prices

Local sheepmen should be more prosperous after the present lamb and wool crop is all sold. Both the quantity and quality of the wool and lambs as well as the prices are better than for several years. Local buyers are paying from 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 cents for lambs and wool is bringing about 40 cents per pound on the present market. Under the present conditions sheepmen will realize the biggest returns in a number of years.

The only difficulty at the present time is that of transportation owing to heavy rail movement of lumber and defense materials, transportation facilities are taxed to capacity.

78 Enrollees Checked Out at Brice Creek

Seventy-eight men checked out of the Bryce Creek CCC camp last Thursday. Most of the enrollees transferred to other camps and some were discharged and went to their homes in the eastern and southern states. The camp strength at the present time consists of 80 enrollees according to Captain Byron Grey.

NON-HIGH SCHOOL BUDGET ADOPTED.

The \$69,945 non-high school district budget was adopted by board members and taxpayers at a meeting held Monday afternoon in the county courthouse, L. C. Moffitt, county school superintendent, announced.

Voters in the non-high school districts voted last night on the proposition of exceeding the six per cent limitation. Total amount of tax levy is \$65,230, exceeding the limitation by \$19,619.68.

Way Cleared for Harvest of Huge Vetch, Pea Crop

An additional million pounds of 1940 crop Oregon hairy vetch seed have recently been shipped to the southern states by the AAA, which is clearing storage space for the 1941 harvest, expected to be the largest in history.

The total 1940 cover crop seed shipments through the AAA purchase program now stand at 690 carloads, with about 1 1/2 million pounds of 1940 crop bought by the AAA still in storage. This will probably be shipped late in June, says John Shepherd of Seio, member of the AAA committee. Announcement of the 1941 program is expected before the new harvest begins, about July 1.

Extension service and AAA estimates show a minimum of 120,000 acres of hairy vetch in Oregon this year, as against 84,000 last year. Growing conditions have been favorable thus far, so that, barring adverse developments, yields are expected to reach at least the long-time average of 250 to 275 pounds per acre.

Austrian field pea acreage has been reduced from last year's 69,000 acres to about 48,000, but prospective yields are so good that the 1941 total tonnage may approximate that of a year ago. About 17,000 acres of Willamette vetch will also be harvested this year for seed.

More than 45 million pounds of cover crop seed were shipped south from 17 Oregon counties under the 1940 AAA seed purchase plan. Growers were paid \$1,665,857.30 for this portion of their crop, in addition to sales through private channels.

Oregon seed purchases made last year through the AAA were Austrian field peas, 36,000,420 pounds; hairy vetch, 7,597,500 pounds; and Italian ryegrass, 1,410,000 pounds. Only about a third of the hairy vetch crop was handled by the AAA. The Oregon seed was shipped to the southern cotton states, where it was distributed in lieu of conservation payments earned under the AAA program.
